

SHERIFF MAY SUE OVER YOUNG AFFAIR

Suit for \$50,000 damages against the city of Jackson, Tenn., and G. T. Brown, Jackson chief of police, may be filed by Sheriff Oliver Hazard Perry, of Shelby county, as a result of taking from Perry's deputies last Friday the negro gunman who slew Police Sgt. J. G. Brinkley.

Lorenzo Young, the negro slayer, was taken from the custody of Deputies Bradley, Goswick, Palmer and Reese at Jackson by a crowd headed by Chief of Police Charles M. Bryan Monday on the charge that they were browbeaten and insulted, and that one man in the chief's party said: "You're no better than the negro. We ought to string you all up."

Sheriff Perry will confer with his attorney, Charles M. Bryan Monday on the advisability of pressing a damage suit against the city and the Jackson chief.
