RED CROSS NOTES

The home service section, Memphis chapter, American Red Cross, announces that E. J. Murphy, vocational advisor of the federal board for vocational education, will be in Memphis for several days beginning July 3. The purpose of his visit is to interest in disabled men, who have been discharged from the army, in the wonderful opportunities offered by a grateful government for vocational training which includes instruction in trades, commercial courses and college and university work.

In a manner, the government foretells any occasion for crippled men to become peddlers, panhandlers and beggars.

Mr. Murphy will make the home service office, 146 Court avenue, his headquarters for his visit. He will be glad to see Mr. Murphy and have a physical report of their disability sent in to the bureau of war risk insurance, even though they do not care to apply at this time for compensation or vocational training. The simple filing of a physical report, makes the men eligible for compensation and vocational education at any subsequent time.

The public is requested to send in to the home service office, telephone 373, the names and addresses of all disabled men from the service, no matter how slight their disability, and whether or not it is known that compensation has been applied for.

The home service section is in a position to assist men to fill out these applications any week day from 9 to 4 o'clock. A volunteer is on duty Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10 to 1 for this special work.

HARDEMAN FARMERS FORM ASSOCIATION
