BEAVER BEATS DOZE CHARGE

Judge Harsh Rules It Was To Be Used Externally for Rheumatism.

Whisky, that well-known cure-all for the ailments of mankind, made from trees, leaves, barks and berries and guaranteed to cure one and all of the human ill, at last has been vindicated in Shelby county, Tennessee, by a jury of 12 good men and true. They found the booze to be a panacea for rheumatism—and this is not patent medicine testimony, although more than 2,000,000 bottles of the well-known fluid have been sold in the past 30 days.

J. C. Beaver, indicted on a charge of violating the liquor law, tried once and temporarily set free by a disgraced jury, went to bat for the second hearing in the second criminal court Friday morning. He was represented by James W. Stewart, attorney.

Beaver did not need to justify. Cross-questioning by Lewis brought out the fact that Beaver, at the time of his arrest had claimed that three plates of whisky found in his possession were to be used as an external application for rheumatic victims. Beaver's father had been a doctor before his death, and the beneficiaries were ex-patients of Beaver, Sr.

Judge Tom Harsh was so impressed that he ordered, by peremptory instruction, a verdict of not guilty.

Taylor Gowen, deputy sheriff, and resident of Raleigh, Tenn., was a witness in the case. He had served as a juror at the time of Beaver's first trial, when the jury was hung. He could not tell whether the whisky then introduced in evidence had been procured before March 15, 1935, the date the liquor laws made it unhealthy to have whisky in one's possession.

Beaver still is under indictment on the same charge in another case.

MISSISSIPPI ROBBERY MAY BE SOLVED

Suspected of having information on the robbing of a postoffice, safe in Mississippi a few miles from the state capitol, a man named C. L. Scott, machinist, 54 years old, was taken into custody late Thursday night at a downtown hotel by postoffice inspectors and Detectives Heckle and Brunner. He was being detained Friday for the federal authorities at the central police office.

GUESSES KANSAS CROP 229,217,000 BUSHELS

TOPEKA, Kan., June 27.—The Kansas wheat crop now being harvested, was estimated at 229,217,000 bushels in the monthly report issued today by J. C. Mohler, secretary of the state board of agriculture. This is an increase of more than 11,000,000 bushels over Mohler's May report and it is approximately 32,000,000 bushels greater than the last federal monthly report.

INDICTMENTS RETURNED AS RESULT OF SEIZURE

The seizure of 23 cases of eye, which caused the arrest of Joe Robertson, S. E. Sadler and R. A. "Dutch" Streuli near Bartlett, resulted in indictments being returned against these three Friday morning by the grand jury. A fourth man was named in the indictment, charging violation of the liquor law, he being Jake Tuckerman.


