

FORMER BIBLE CLASS MAN WEARS D. S. C.

LOCAL SENTENCES IN SEVEN CASES AFFIRMED

The Circuit Court of Appeals in Cincinnati has handed down opinions affirming the decisions in seven cases appealed from the November term of the local United States court. Six of the cases were for violation of the Road amendment and carried prison terms of six months to one year with fines from \$150 to \$1,000.

The cases and the sentences which were affirmed are: Harry Langley, six months in the Shelby county jail and \$50 fine and costs; Bob Berryman, six months and \$1,000 fine and costs each; Tom Bishop, six months in the Shelby county jail and \$150 fine and costs; E. K. Bradford, convicted for embezzling a government official, one year and a day at the federal prison at Atlanta and a fine of \$500 and costs.

FARMER MULLINS FREED OF LIQUOR ACCUSATION

JACKSON, Tenn., July 2 (SpI)—Ed Mullins, a farmer, was acquitted of the charge of making and selling liquor following a two days' trial in criminal court. Mullins was arrested several weeks ago by Deputy U. S. Marshal Chas. King and several state officers. A warrant was taken from his home. Mullins is now under bond in the federal court and will face trial on the charge of "moonshining" at the next session of Judge McCall's tribunal here.

THREE CONVICTS ESCAPE FROM ARKANSAS PRISON

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., July 2 (SpI)—Penitentiary officials have obtained no trace of three convicts who, after holding up two guards, scaled the walls at the penitentiary last night and escaped. The escape was made shortly after midnight. The escaped men had two revolvers which had been smuggled into them. The three who escaped were Will Bishop, Crawford county, serving 12 years for burglary; Oak Lewis, Mississippi county, also serving 12 years for burglary; and Fred Berger, Prairie county, serving 18 months for grand larceny.

LITTLE ROCK, C. OF C. TO SETTLE FUTRALL ROW

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., July 2 (SpI)—The board of commerce here last night adopted a resolution proposing an investigation by an impartial tribunal of three members, of the controversy between the Arkansas profitable farming bureau and the University of Arkansas.

Under the plan which will be submitted to the university, each side would choose one arbitrator and the two arbitrators choose the third. Should the university accept the proposal and a finding adverse to President J. C. Futrall should be returned, he would be obliged to resign; should the finding be adverse to the profitable farming bureau, the bureau would disband.
