### MORE FLOOD PROTECTION URGED FOR YAZOO

YAZOO CITY, Miss., July 18. (Sp.)—A more comprehensive system of flood control for this section of the state, and especially for that section lying east of the Yazoo river, was urged particularly by Dr. J. C. Zeller, candidate for the state senate, in an address delivered at the courthouse in Yazoo City to a very good audience. The present system under which Yazoo county is paying taxes for the maintenance of the Mississippi levee system, said Dr. Zeller, means nothing more than the taxes of those who live east of the Yazoo river.

### ARMY TRUCKS ARE AT WORK IN YAZOO COUNTY

YAZOO CITY, Miss., July 18. (Sp.)—The big army trucks being loaned to the counties of Mississippi by the federal government for the building of good roads have reached Yazoo City and will be set to work in this county. Request has been made by Yazoo county for five of the trucks, but the request of three of the trucks went forward a short time later than the first request for two trucks, and it is probable that the remainder of the Yazoo county trucks will not be obtained until the state receives another supply from the federal government.

### JOHNSTON CLUB FORMED AT YAZOO CITY, MISS.

YAZOO CITY, Miss., July 18. (Sp.)—The Johnston club, the first political organization in the present campaign in Yazoo county, has become a permanent organization with 318 members. At a recent meeting the club at the courthouse there were 50 present, and the temporary organization formed more than a month ago was converted into a permanent organization by the election of all of the temporary officers as permanent officers. T. W. Hemingway remains permanent chairman and M. J. McGuire permanent secretary.

### TO HOLD BIG RALLY.

YAZOO CITY, Miss., July 18. (Sp.)—Zeiglerville, on the eastern edge of Yazoo county, plans a big political rally and picnic on Wednesday, July 23, to which all the aspirants to the office of governor of Mississippi have been invited, and all the candidates of Yazoo and Bolivar counties are expected to attend. There will be a basket dinner at Zeiglerville on that day and the League orchestra has been secured to furnish music on the occasion.

### PIPE ORGAN INSTALLED.

HELENA, Ark., July 18. (Sp.)—A new pipe organ has been purchased for the First Baptist church and will be shipped from the factory here very soon. This instrument will replace an old one that had been in service many years. With the installation of the new organ some changes will be made in the interior.

### TWO TENNESSEANS ARE DECORATED FOR VALOR

WASHINGTON, July 18. (Sp.)—Two more Tennesseans have been awarded the distinguished service cross by Gen. John J. Pershing for heroic conduct on the front.

Second Lieut. Herbert J. Jones (deceased), Sixth field artillery, was awarded the D.S.C. for extraordinary heroism in action near Coullemelle, France, July 4, 1918. During a heavy enemy bombardment he exposed himself fearlessly to go to the assistance of a wounded soldier, being killed by shell fire while engaged in this heroic action.

Next of kin, Judge Joseph E. Jones, Dresden, Tenn.

Private Walter Potter, Company I, 131st infantry, was awarded the D.S.C. for extraordinary heroism in action near Bois de Harcelle, France, Nov. 10, 1918. He volunteered and crawled out in the face of enemy fire to attack a machine gun nest. He killed the four members of the enemy crew, inspiring the men serving with him by his example of heroism.
