GERMANS CONSTRUCT NOISELESS AIRPLANES

BERNE, July 15.—According to dispatches to Swiss newspapers German manufacturers after many experiments, have succeeded in creating a gasoline turbine. The engine, it is asserted, will enable an airplane to fly virtually without noise. The dispatches add that several airplanes fitted with the new engine are being constructed. They will have a capacity of 44 passengers each.

TWO KILLED, THREE SHOT IN FIGHT OVER MELON

DENMARK, S. C., July 15.—Two negroes were killed and three white men wounded here in a shooting affray which is said to have started over the theft of a watermelon. Agent Brown, a negro, had a white man and a negro haled into court on a charge of stealing a melon from Brown's patch, but the magistrate freed them. As they left the court room, Brown is said to have started shooting. He and another negro were killed. No arrests have been made.

NO AMERICAN CONSULS ON JOBS IN GERMANY

PARIS, July 15. (By the Associated Press).—There are no American consuls in German ports as yet. British, French and other European consuls are already clearing ships. The American relief administration has cleared in German ports two food supply ships and one with cotton, but Director-General Hoover refuses to issue papers to additional ships without legal authority. The cotton cargo was for Czechoslovakia; the food ships carried cargoes privately owned for German sale.

DECORATED LIEUTENANT TO WED RED CROSS NURSE

NEW YORK, July 15.—Among passengers arriving on the Roma yesterday was Lieut. Joseph Young, of Chicago, who wore a Croix de Guerre and French Legion of Honor medals won during his 17 months overseas. He was wounded seven times. He said he was hastening to Kansas City, Mo., where he is expected to wed a young woman of that city who was formerly a Red Cross nurse in France. He said she accepted his cable proposal on the day he was commissioned.

TWO HUN CAPTIVES OF WAR COMING TO U. S.

WASHINGTON, July 15.—Two German prisoners of war, assigned to the director of the military intelligence, are aboard the steamer Agamemnon, due at New York July 22, according to the schedule of transport sailings announced at the war department. War department officials said they had information as to the purpose in bringing the Germans to the United States.

HOME DEMONSTRATION BY NEGROES CONTINUES

CONWAY, Ark., July 15. (Sp.)—Negroes of the county have made up a fund which will enable the negro home demonstration agent to continue his work until Dec. 1. Federal funds for the continuance of the agent's work were exhausted on June 15, and a meeting was called to make good the deficit.

MAN FREED OF MURDER CHARGE, BUT HELD INSANE

BAY MINETTE, Ala., July 15.—Walter Bishop was declared "not guilty by reason of insanity" by a jury here last night. He was charged with the shooting of Frank Foukal to death in jail here, June 22.

TWO TENNESSEE BOYS WIN MEDALS; ONE DEAD

WASHINGTON, July 15.—Distinguished service crosses have been awarded Lieut. Herbert J. Jones, deceased, Dresden, Tenn., and Walter Potter, Dayton, Tenn. It was announced today.

NEGRO IS LYNCHED

BELZONI, Miss., July 15.—Sheriff O. G. Turner has verified the reported lynching of a negro at Louise, Miss., Tuesday night, when he returned from the scene. Sheriff Turner said Robert Truett, 18 years old, negro, was hanged on a bridge by a mob. It is alleged the negro insulted a married white woman after forcing an entrance into her room. The officer denied the report that Truett was a former soldier, but said the belief was that he had obtained his idea from a discharged negro soldier. No arrests were made.

TO BUILD NEW ROAD

HUNTSVILLE, Ala., July 15. (Sp.)—A first-class road to connect the pike systems of Jackson and Madison counties will be constructed between Gurley and Paint Rock with money to be subscribed in Huntsville and Scottsboro. The new road will make the route complete between Huntsville and Scottsboro, and later when more improvements are made east of Scottsboro, there will be a good road from here all the way to Chattanooga.

LEGION AIDS SOLDIERS

CONWAY, Ark., July 15. (Sp.)—Blanks for use of soldiers and sailors in making application for additional travel pay have been secured by the American legion here, and will be distributed among the former service men. Many Faulkner men discharged at a great distance from home have been unable to secure the extra pay now being blank forms, and the legion at once relieved the situation by securing a large supply.

WILL REVIEW TROOPS

WASHINGTON, July 15.—Czechoslovak troops numbering 1,056, who were evacuated from Siberian fighting lines and started back home across the United States, will parade down Pennsylvania avenue late today and be reviewed by President Wilson from a stand in front of the White House.

MAIL ORDERS FILLED WHEN ACCOMPANIED BY CASH

SIMS SLATED AS NEXT BIG U. S. NAVAL CHIEF

WASHINGTON, July 15.—Rear Admiral William S. Sims, commander of the American naval forces abroad during the war, in the opinion of well informed naval officers will be the next chief of naval operations, the highest noncivilian office in the navy. The post which will become vacant with the retirement by age of Admiral William S. Benson, Sept. 25, carries with it the responsibility of directing the navy's operations in predicting the move today pointed out by making Rear Admiral Sims chief of naval operations. Secretary Daniels would at once restore the officer to the rank he held abroad and also reward him for his administration of the overseas forces during the war. Rear Admiral Sims at present is junior to a number of officers who were themselves outranked by him until a few months ago.

REDFIELD PROVES U. S. POSTS NOT "SOFT JOBS"

WASHINGTON, July 15.—Government work is no "soft job," according to Secretary Redfield, who in asking congress today for authority to employ 10 additional clerks in his office, said that during the last five months 99 employees had worked 424 days over-time. He also complained that in the last two years there had been 260 separations from 128 positions in one bureau of the department of commerce. Work of the department, he said, had doubled since the signing of the armistice because of the removal of war restrictions on commerce.

MUNITIONS DUMP BLOWS UP, SEVERAL KILLED

PARIS, July 15.—A number of persons were killed or injured yesterday when a large munitions dump was blown up at Le Bourget, seven miles northeast of Paris. Seven buildings were destroyed by the concussion and sheds on the aviation field collapsed and took fire, causing injury to a number of soldiers and civilian employees.

TO OBSERVE HEROES' DAY

HUNTSVILLE, Ala., July 15. (Sp.)—The chamber of commerce is preparing to announce plans for the celebration of "Heroes' day," on one of the dates of the approaching Madison county fair, Oct. 23-25. The occasion will be a recognition of the appreciation in which the people of the county regard the boys who went from here to the army and navy during the war. The names of all will be secured if possible and posted conspicuously.

MATERNITY IS PLACED UNDER STATE BY HUNS

LONDON, July 15.—A wireless dispatch received here says the Weimar assembly has adopted a bill placing maternity under the care of the state. A proposal by the independents that the mother of an illegitimate child should actually be designated as "tramp" was carried by a vote of 138 to 133. It was also decided by the assembly that the same educational and social opportunities should be provided by legislation for illegitimate as legitimate children. Likewise it was decided that large families were entitled to state assistance.

PANAMA MOTHERS KICK ON EDUCATIONAL CUT

PANAMA, July 15.—Mothers in various villages of the canal zone held meetings yesterday to protest against curtailment of educational facilities rendered necessary because of reduced appropriations. The employees of the canal zone are displaying resentment over the fact that increases granted government employees in the United States have not been granted them. There is considerable sentiment in favor of a general strike, but no action in this direction has yet been taken.

TO SINK OIL WELL

CONWAY, Ark., July 15. (Sp.)—Excitement in connection with oil drills in this county was continued by the announcement by a Little Rock company that it would shortly sink a well either in Faulkner or in Palski county, near the Faulkner line. The point at which the well is proposed for sinking is near the export farm, where it is said a drill will be made. A third company also has announced that a test will be made of Faulkner strata, which geologists of national reputation have made extended study.
