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Tells Commerce Body Railways Should Be Returned to Owners.

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"Unless you are working on a plan which includes the return of the roads to private management what I may say to you will be of no value whatever," Mr. Wimbish said.

"If you are going to adopt government ownership of the roads it is going to surrender to the demands made upon it—which is unthinkable—and he does not believe you will believe there is enough patriotism, enough courage in this congress not to be stampeded and intimidated and forced to do things that fail to meet its approval. I cannot believe that these extremely radical propositions represent as a thought of intelligent working men."

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"But I know," he added, "that you are infinitely better prepared to consider these railroad problems than is organized labor, and if you do get intimidated or stampeded, some people will not stand behind you. It is just as well to look the situation squarely in the face. The only way to deal with it is calmly, unflinchingly, and with the single thought of determining what is best for the whole country, not for one class."

Representative Sims, Democrat, Tennessee, who introduced Saturday the Plumb plan bill and who stated he had done this just as he would have presented any other measure by request, wanted to know what Mr. Wimbish thought of so-called demands by capital in framing a general railroad bill, referring to a request for a 5 per cent return on investments.

"This committee or congress should not surrender to capital any more than it should surrender to labor," he replied. "Just sit tight and find out what is best for the people and don't be intimidated and don't be stampeded by this latest threat of labor leaders."

Henry C. Page was born at Frankfurt, Ky., and when but a lad moved to Memphis. He associated himself with Nick Malatesta, which association lasted until Mr. Page's death. In later years Mr. Page was connected with John J. Collins in the taxicab business.

Mr. Page was married some years ago to Mary Malatesta, sister of Nick Malatesta and Mrs. John T. Williams, who preceded him in death some years ago. He was again married later to Mrs. Emma Green.

Surviving are his wife, a brother, L. Page, two daughters, Mrs. Dr. A. L. Holden and Mrs. Sam L. Kohn, all of Memphis, and three sons, C. C. Page, H. C. Page and H. N. Page and Arthur Page of Indianapolis.
