WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—There is no denying the fact that although the views of Director-General Hines against any general increase in railroad wages fairly well known, the national capital was somewhat taken aback by President Wilson's firm stand against increases at this time. Again and again, as the Wilson administration has developed its policies in the last six years, there has been such a noticeable friction between the president and a member of congress took it for granted that all the railroad men had to do to get increases. On the other hand, the logic of the situation called for a declaration of the kind made by the president in his address to congress on the high cost of living that the situation could not be met by increasing wages without starting another cycle of costs. It was not a flat tirade, however, for the director-general of railroads recommended that the wages of shopmen be equalized.

In some cases this means an increase of four cents an hour, in others as much as nine cents. Furthermore, the railroad administration announced that all clerical and office employees other than shopmen who feel that they have a just claim for equalization should present such claims. Employees employed in maintenance of ways for instance are thought to have a just grievance.

No General Boosts.
But any general increase based upon the high cost of living can not be granted for the simple reason that the administration hopes to reduce that cost. Furthermore, it is not an end to calculations who would introduce as permanent things in American economic life those things which were operative during the war as a result either of emergency construction or world shortages produced by war needs.

Just as the government believes the high profits enjoyed by manufacturers of clothing and other commodities involved in the high cost of living should go down, it believes that wages should not be increased to raise the costs to manufacturers. When the war ended there was much agitation about reducing wages. Many manufacturers took the position also that the war increases in wages could be absorbed. But it was definitely assumed that wages would not rise, but would for the most part be held at war levels. The president therefore is attempting to prevent a general upward tendency in labor costs which would defeat the government's effort to persuade manufacturers to reduce their prices on necessities of life.

Generally speaking, the railroad men who met the president were not pleased. They left the White House looking very glum. They eagerly looked for a definite assurance that the president would protect their interests when legislation regarding the return of the railroads to government ownership before him for signature. The plain inference of his remarks was that he would not adjust the machinery for the adjustment of wage disputes, machinery on which the railroad men had satisfactory representation and the public's interest were fully protected against strikes on unwarranted basis.

Will Keep Control.
One thing is clear, the government may return the roads to private ownership but it will retain control over many questions which may affect the credits and finances of the railroads and to retaining power.



PSKOV CAPTURED BY BOLSHIEVIKI
Soviet Forces Also Claim New Successes on Volga With Taking of Town.

LONDON, Aug. 27.—Pskov, southwest of Petrograd, has been captured by Bolshevik forces, according to an official statement issued at noon.
The Bolsheviks also claim successes on the Volga in Gen. Denikine's territory. They report the capture of Khamin on the Volga, 130 miles southwest of Saratov, and say their forces are advancing toward Tzaritzin, 190 miles further south on the Volga.

GENIUNE DOMINATING DISTRICT OF WIDE-SCOPE
PARIS, Aug. 27. (By the Associated Press.)—Gen. Denikine, the anti-Bolshevik leader in Southern Russia, now dominates a territory larger than Germany, and his forces are daily progressing into Central Russia with comparatively slight opposition.
His actual front two days ago, according to accurate military information received here, extended from a few miles east of Odessa northward to Elizabethgrad, then north to a few miles south of Kyrak, thence east to Novochoperek, continuing to a point on the Volga a few miles south of Saratov.
(Since this dispatch was filed the capture of Odessa by anti-Bolshevik forces has been announced.)
Gen. Denikine also occupies all the Caucasus region from the Caspian to the Black sea, and south to the Georgian border. His forces are not occupying Astrakhan, at the mouth of the Volga, but he controls traffic on that river by occupying Tzaritzin and a stretch along the river running northward for a distance of 200 miles.

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Mule Gets "Lit" On 2-3-4 Per Cent Beer And Kills Itself

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—Two mules that had imbibed vast quantities of 2-3-4 beer they found in a keg went on a rampage in Brooklyn today, which was only ended when one of the crazed animals committed suicide by plunging through a plate-glass window in an undertaker's shop.

The mules were turned out to pasture by James Doherty, Flatbush. There had been a picnic in the field yesterday and the party had left a half keg of beer. One of the mules knocked over the keg and the beer ran into a depression in the ground. They eagerly lapped it up and then the fun started. Several hundred men and boys chased them. When the mules reached a position opposite an undertaker's shop run by Martin Jones at 442 Herkimer street, one of them crashed through the window and fell unconscious. He died in a few moments. The other mule was captured several blocks away. He was returned to the pasture.
