## PLANTER CHARGED WITH MURDER OF HIS YOUNG WIFE

Autopsy Showed That Neck of Mrs. Clyde Thames Had Been Broken Whereupon Husband Is Indicted.

BROOKHAVEN, Miss., Sept. 5 (Sp.)—Clyde Thames, the husband of Mrs. da Thames, whose body was discovered at Antioch church cemetery in Lawrence county on last Tuesday and whose neck found to be broken, has been indicted by the Lincoln county grand jury, now in session in this city, upon his charge of murder, and is now confined in the Lincoln county jail. Witnesses who attended the investigation that was made at the cemetery and other persons thought to have any knowledge of the facts surrounding the death of the deceased, went before the grand jury on Wednesday and the grand jury returned a true bill charging the husband with the murder of his wife.

Sheriff W. Ed Smith went immediately to the home of the accused man, located in this county, and arrested him and brought him to Brookhaven, where he was lodged in jail. Thames was in the field picking cotton at the time of his arrest and up to this time has made no statement relative to the crime. It is understood that he will employ counsel. The criminal docket will be called on next Monday morning at which the defendant will be arraigned upon the charge.

Mrs. Thames was buried on Aug. 8, at Antioch church cemetery, just across the Lincoln county line in Lawrence county. Her death was presumably caused from heart failure, as it was known that she was being treated by a physician for this trouble prior to her death. Rumors of foul play, however, were so persistent after the body had been interred, that her father, M. D. Herring, of Bogalusa, La., and other relatives and friends decided to exhumed the body and make a complete examination of its condition in the presence of a reputable physician. After the permission had been secured to exhume the body, Dr. R. T. Conn, the county health officer of Lawrence county, was called upon for this purpose, and in the presence of the other officers from Lincoln and Lawrence counties, and the presence of the relatives and friends of the dead woman, made this examination. The examination made at the graveyard at Antioch church on last Tuesday revealed the fact that the woman's neck had been broken prior to her death, and witnesses were immediately subpoenaed before the grand jury, now in session in the city of Brookhaven, to testify in the matter, with the result that a true bill was returned Thursday morning against the husband.

The defendant is a young man, apparently 25 years of age, and has been living in this county for a number of years, where he is engaged in farming operations. He was married about five or six years ago to Miss Ida Herring, and two children were born to them; one child now five years of age, and the other an infant of 2½ years. The gruesome disclosures made at the examination of the body on last Tuesday has created a good deal of excitement throughout the entire county, where both families are well known. The father of the dead woman, M. D. Herring, of Bogalusa, La., was in Brookhaven on Wednesday, taking an active interest in the examination being made before the grand jury, though his name does not appear as a witness on the indictment.

## ARKANSAS LOSES IN CORPORATE TAX

Assessment of Public Service Corporations Falls Below Figures Last Year.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Sept. 5 (Sp.)—Assessments of Arkansas public service corporations this year total \$1,772,820 less than last year, according to a recapitulation obtained from records of the state tax commission Friday morning. The assessments this year show a decrease in every class except telephone companies, and the net gain in telephone company assessments was only \$25,000. The assessments this year total \$1,696,298, and the assessments last year totaled \$1,818,678.82.

Assessments of the larger railroad corporations, and several other large corporations were published several weeks ago. Since then the commission has passed upon all the smaller corporations of the state which come under its jurisdiction.

Railroad assessments showed a net decrease of \$1,489,029; utilities, \$194,663; telegraph lines, sleeping car companies and express companies combined, \$196,060; bridges and ferries, \$13,900.

Assessments of smaller public service corporations as shown by the commission's records include:

Dardanelle & Russellville railroad, \$58,880; Fore Smith & Western, \$51,370; Gould & Southwestern, \$42,460; decrease from \$60,370; Helena, Parkins & Northern, \$50,917; Crittenden Railway company, \$49,847; Helena Southwestern, \$107,875; Jonesboro, Lake City & Eastern, \$52,510; Louisiana & Pine Bluff, \$50,000; Missouri, Arkansas & Western, \$53,260; Pine Bluff, Sheridan & Southern, \$60,216; Arkansas Light and Power company, \$418,488, a decrease from \$445,498; Clear Creek Oil and Gas company, \$141,813, a decrease from \$124,787; Fayetteville and Electric company, \$65,000, a decrease from \$70,461; Helena Water company, \$76,777; Helena Gas and Electric company, \$369,588; Pine Bluff company, \$608,150, a decrease from \$669,294; Van Buren Water company, \$40,865; Walden Light and Ice company, \$3,900; Wildcat Oil and Gas company, \$35,590; Greenwood Telephone company, \$50,500, an increase from \$4,890; Home Telephone Company of Franklin county, \$10,980.

## POLICEMAN WHO KILLED NEGRO STILL IN JAIL

NATCHEZ, Miss., Sept. 5 (Sp.)—No move has yet been made about the release from jail of Lee Worley, former policeman, charged with killing Lon Sanders, a negro, on a writ of habeas corpus, although such action on the part of his attorneys is expected. Worley was committed to jail by Judge W. A. Foster, following a preliminary hearing.

Worley, who has three honorable discharges from military service, had been on the police force for only a short time when he killed Sanders. He claimed that the negro took his club from him and that he was forced to fire in self defense, while witnesses for the state declared that the negro was running away from Worley and was shot in the back.

## PRESBYTERIANS FAVOR QUICK RATIFICATION

LAKE GENEVA, Wis., Sept. 5.—Delegates attending the Presbyterian New Era conference here went on record today in favor of immediate ratification of the peace treaty. The Rev. Minot Morgan, of Detroit, objected strenuously to endorsement of the peace treaty. "If it meant sacrificing Korea and Shantung to the mercy of the Japanese," Dr. George N. Loomis, of Wooster, O., said he sympathized fully with Shantung and Korea, but he thought the Presbyterians, nevertheless, ought not to weaken in their position favoring speedy ratification of peace. The endorsement of speedy ratification of the treaty was adopted by a unanimous vote.

## POLISH TROOPS HELD UP BY GERMAN RAILWAYS

COLENZ, Sept. 5 (By the Associated Press)—Fourteen hundred Polish soldiers who came to the American area for the purpose of transporting to Poland 4,000 horses and mules which were purchased from the United States army are being held up indefinitely near this city by Germany's refusal to undertake supervision of hauling troops and animals across Germany by rail. The Germans hold that the shortage of coal and lack of locomotives makes the task impossible under present conditions.
