HONDURAN REBELS CAPTURE LA CEIBA







GRAND JURY REFUSES TO INDICT HUSBAND SLAYER

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Sept. 10. (Sp.)—The Pulaski county grand jury today refused to indict Mrs. Alma Calvert, formerly of Memphis, who shot and killed her husband, Roy Calvert, a switchman here about 10 days ago. Mrs. Calvert, who has been held in jail pending the grand jury action, probably was released this afternoon on her own recognition. No action was taken when she had a hearing in the municipal court last week, the case being passed directly to the grand jury. Sentiment here favored the release of the woman, who said she killed her husband because of his inhuman treatment to her. Many neighbors testified as to Calvert's abuse of his wife.

PRESBYTERIANS ARE TO RAISE HUGE FUND

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Sept. 10.—Plans for the campaign of the Southern Presbyterian church in its three-year progressive program were among subjects considered here today by the systematic benevolence and stewardship committee of the church's general assembly. The campaign, which is to be conducted during the first three months of next year, will aim to raise one-third of the \$2,000,000 for the three-year program which will be devoted to the causes of the church—missions, education, ministerial relief, publication and the assembly's training school for Christian workers, at Richmond, Va. Sixty per cent of the money will be applied to the general assembly's other 40 per cent to the synod's causes. Chattanooga has been chosen headquarters of the committee. Rev. A. D. J. Gilmore, Spartanburg, S. C., is chairman, and H. E. Maguire, Richmond, Va., treasurer, who are also members of the campaign committee, of which Rev. Homer McMillan, Atlanta, is chairman, and whose members include Rev. John I. Armstrong, Nashville; Rev. H. Sweet, Louisville; Rev. J. E. West, Morristown, Tenn.; and T. E. West, Tallahassee, Fla.

CAPT. G. A. HAYES WILL TALK ON SOCIAL EVIL

Capt. George H. Hayes will address the Memphis and Shelby County Medical Society on the laws governing the reporting of preventable disease. The meeting will be held in the First criminal court room Tuesday night, Sept. 23. Capt. Hayes has charge of the government crusade in Tennessee against special diseases which the public health service is making. Recently congress appropriated a large sum for this work, a certain amount being allotted to each state. Capt. Hayes will be in Memphis three days, Sept. 22, 23 and 24. While here he will also address the Rotary club, the Lions' club and the Kawanis club.

LEWIS THREATENS TO FORCE END OF STRIKE

SCHANTON, Pa., Sept. 10.—Word came today from John L. Lewis, acting president of the United Mine Workers of America, in session at Cleveland, that if the strike of 26,000 miners of the Lakawanna and Hudson companies is not quickly ended he will send the full force of the organization here to convince the strikers of their error in violating agreements and the laws of the nation.

FIGHT ON NAMING OF TWO ENVOY SAT END

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—Opposition to the nomination of William E. Gonzalez, of Columbia, S. C., to be ambassador to Peru virtually ended today when the senate foreign relations committee unanimously ordered a favorable report on his appointment, and recommended senate confirmation. The foreign relations committee also today ordered reported the nomination of former Gov. Benton McMillin, of Tennessee, to be American minister to Guatemala. He has been minister to Peru and his nomination for the transfer has been held up with that of Mr. Gonzalez because of objections of Tennessee senators to the transfer. Mr. Gonzalez has been under investigation by a foreign relations subcommittee, which today submitted its report and the action of the full committee followed. He formerly was minister to Cuba and was named as ambassador to Peru when the rank of an American representative there was raised from minister.


