FORMER MISSISSIPPI SHERIFF SUDDENLY CALLED BY DEATH

The body of Robert M. Edwards, 27 Stonewall place, will arrive in Memphis Friday and funeral will be held from the late residence Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock. Burial will follow in Edinwood cemetery. The services will be conducted by the Rev. R. DuM. Devall, of St. Mary's cathedral.

Mr. Edwards died suddenly Wednesday afternoon at the Parkway hotel, Chicago, whence he had gone for treatment, having been in failing health for some weeks.

H. McTraney, Alligator, Miss.; J. D. Smith, Hillhouse, Miss.; Walter Sellers, Jr., Rosedale, and Dr. B. S. Holt, Duncan, Miss.

Honorary pallbearers will be Dave Reinlich, of Rosedale; Walter Cotton, Sam Rembert, Sr., Hugh Connell, of Memphis, and Walter Sellers, Sr., of Rosedale; Dr. Fred Shelby, of Shelby, Miss.; and Dr. James Murray, of Shelby, Miss.

Mr. Edwards was born in Leake county, Mississippi, but had lived near Hillhouse, in Bolivar county, for the past 30 years. Although he spent most of his time on his plantation in Bolivar county, Mississippi, his family has resided in Memphis for the past 15 years. While sheriff of Bolivar county Mr. Edwards became a political figure known throughout the state.

There survive his widow, who before her marriage was Miss Evelyn Rainier; one son, R. M. Edwards, Jr.; two daughters, Mrs. Elizabeth Guyon Armstrong and Miss Ruth Edwards; his mother, Mrs. Adelaide Edwards, all of Memphis; two brothers, Leake Edwards, of Gun-nison, Miss., and J. S. Edwards, of Shelby, Miss.; and two sisters, Miss Kate Robey, of Cleveland, Miss., and Mrs. Kate Martin, of Meridian, Miss.

protection of American institutions is a traitor to his country. "The cry of partisanship is raised as though the defense of the constitution and of the independence of this nation were partisanship; while the proposal to transfer to Europe and Asia the control of our foreign relations by some process of political party reasoning is said to be entirely non-partisan, although nine-tenths of those who defend it would be opposed if it were not for the fact that the head of their party administers this in chief appointment."

The first duty devolving upon us in concrete form and under the league of nations is to send an army to police Turkey for the protection of Armenia. The press agents of the administration say it will take 100,000 men. The war department experts figure it will require 150,000 men. To assemble, train, clad and transport an army of either 150,000 or 200,000 men and maintain them 4,000 miles from home, will cost more than \$1,000,000,000. Who is to pay the \$1,000,000,000? Is it to be the farmers of America, the poor people of the country, upon whom the burden of taxation, ultimately inevitably rests?"

POINDEXTER SAYS LEAGUE IS SURE TO BRING WARFARE
DUNKIRK, N. Y., Sept. 11.—The league of nations was attacked here today by Senator Poindexter, Republican, Washington, as a harbinger of world strife. Even in its incipient form and in the act of its creation, the league, the senator said, has stirred up racial quarrels and animosities between the United States and many foreign nations.

"The future operation of the league," he added, "is bound to intensify these quarrels and antagonisms and bring war instead of the promised peace to the world."

"Many people who have been strong in favor of the league," continued Senator Poindexter, "disapprove of nearly everything that the league has done. The nations acting together in the peace conference at Paris constitute the same nations, represented in the same way, as the league of nations, and they are disapproving and winking the action of these nations in league in the peace conference giving Japan control of Shanghai. They do not like the proposal to give Greek settlements to our enemy Bulgaria, as advocated by our representatives in the conference and yet they advocate the league of nations, because they regard this as dishonorable and wicked things in its inception and formation at some time in the future by some process of management. It will do good things. The good things that it will do in the future are purely imaginary while the bad things that it has done and is doing in the present are actual."

"A former attorney-general of the United States infected with the league disease," he said, "has urged the league without amendment, and then appeal to the league for the protection of American institutions. The man who advises the surrender of American institutions to foreign control and the dependence upon the good graces of that foreign control for the protection of our institutions."
