Haack Tipped to Be Manager of Pat Moore

Pair Have Just Returned From Mysterious Trip to New Orleans Where Much Interesting News Was Learned.

Those who sit in waiting for surprises should be prepared for one of tremendous importance—one that concerns Billy Haack, the promoter, and Pat Moore, the Memphis candidate for the heavyweight championship of the world. And unless all signs fail Billy Haack will soon supplant Tommy Ryan and Nate Lewis as the bantam manager.

This is no certain fact for the affair is yet to be settled, but at the same time it is a fact that Haack has been against a consummation of the brilliant idea. The story is like this:

Wednesday night Moore and Haack went to New Orleans without an announcement of any nature. Friday they returned with a smile that completely belied the fact that they were more at least than the ancient sphinx and when asked if Haack was to step in as his new manager, Haack replied in the broader. Therefore the conclusion:

Moore did not remain in Memphis but went to Chicago to clear up several matters with Lewis and Walsh.

While Haack would not discuss the matter openly, he did bring back interesting news from the trip. He got to New Orleans on Friday and immediately met with C. Hoyt, the Boston club had already agreed to pay \$2,500 for the player. A mix-up in telegrams was the cause of the controversy.
