ROBERTS EXPLAINS OFFICIAL ATTITUDE

Governor Likens Himself to Sheriff—Knoxville Labor Unions Vote on Strike.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Oct. 27 (Sp.)—In discussing the relationship of the governor to the maintenance of law and order at the law and order meet for East Tennessee, in session here today, Gov. Roberts said that he occupied the same position with respect to the state that the sheriff sustains with reference to two men fighting in the presence of the sheriff.

He must warn the fighters against violence or breach of law, and if either commits an overt act it is the duty of the sheriff to interfere and arrest the violator. This, said the governor, is his attitude as to the street car strike situation in Knoxville.

The law and order conference is very largely attended, and speakers from many parts of East Tennessee are being heard in appeals for maintenance of order. The threatened coal strike in the mines of East Tennessee next Friday night render the situation in this section still further precarious, and the conference may take some action respecting this. Gen. E. M. Lewis, with 500 federal soldiers, including one machine gun company, is expected to reach Knoxville this afternoon from Camp Gordon, Atlanta, in response to a summons from Gov. Roberts. About 300 state troops are also here.

Local labor unions today are taking a referendum vote as to whether all organized labor, except certain railroad unions and the policemen and firemen's union, shall go on strike next Friday night at "quitting time" to remain out three days, or six days or longer, if necessary, to break the street car strike in favor of the strikers. The Central Labor union delegates, representing almost 50 local unions, last night voted favorably for a sympathetic strike. About 8,000 men and women are in these unions.

It is predicted that the sympathetic strike will be ordered by a large majority vote. The Knoxville Railway and Light company is operating 25 cars today, an increase of four over the number running yesterday. Every line is covered on a 30-minute schedule. About 100 strikebreakers are now employed.

EXTRA SESSION IS NOT LIKELY, SAYS ROBERTS

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Oct. 27 (Sp.)—Gov. Roberts stated here today that there is little possibility of an extra session of the legislature.

If a session is called, among questions which would come up besides enacting food profiteering would be the question of extending the corporate limits of Chattanooga to suburbs which have voted favorably for such an extension. He stated that the most important thing now is to maintain law and order all other questions being secondary.

PARK FIELD OFFICERS ASSIGNED ELSEWHERE

Several officers are leaving Park field for other aviation fields, and Capt. H. C. Frisbee, for the past year officer in charge of the quartermaster's department, has left for New York to make his home, having received his discharge from army service. Lieut. Charles E. Thomas, Jr., and Lieut. Clarence Wilson have been assigned to Kelly field, Texas, and will leave in a few days via the air route.

Lieut. George Hays, a Memphian, and Lieut. O. H. Cox, of Indiana, also have been discharged and have left the flying field for their homes.

Capt. Helan and Lieut. Arnold, the only pilots at Park field at present, hopped off Tuesday for Magnolia, Miss., where they will do stunt flying at the county fair. They are scheduled to return Wednesday.

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

M. & O. WILL AGAIN SHIP FREIGHT TO BIRMINGHAM

The Mobile & Ohio railroad has been authorized by the federal railroad administration to re-establish its freight service into Birmingham, Ala., on Nov. 1, it was announced Tuesday. The resumption of short line service into Birmingham will give Memphis another trunk line to the southeast through the Birmingham gateway.

P. Jackson, formerly assistant general freight agent with headquarters at Birmingham, now traffic secretary at Tuscaloosa, Ala., will be restored to his former position and will have control of the railroads and discontinued the M. & O. service into that city.

A number of train crews will be put on by the M. & O. to handle its trains between Corinth, Miss., and Birmingham, providing employment for quite a number of trainmen.

Memphis shippers are greatly pleased at the action of the railroad administration in restoring the M. & O. service which will be an important addition to the city's railroad facilities to the southeast. The announcement, following closely the announcement that the administration contemplates a speedy restoration of the Cotton Belt service into Memphis, leads local shippers to hope that several other railroad connections formerly enjoyed by Memphis before the railroads passed from private control may soon be restored.

FURNITURE DEALER ACCUSES ANOTHER

Declaring that the Rhodes Furniture company published a card of warning to the public directed at his firm, the firm of Rosenbaum & Mendel, furniture dealers, has issued Tuesday through his attorneys, Goodman & Williams, filed suit for damages in the sum of \$50,000 against the Rhodes company.

The plaintiffs said that they purchased a quantity of Hoosier kitchen cabinets and that on Oct. 26 advertised them for sale in a Memphis newspaper. On Oct. 27 and 28, he alleges, there appeared in the Memphis papers an advertisement by the Rhodes Furniture company under the caption of "A Warning to the Public," and calling on the public to beware of dealers attempting to use the name and reputation of the Hoosier cabinets, of which they, the Rhodes Furniture company, had exclusive agency in Memphis.

FT. PICKERING LOYAL LEAGUE INAUGURATED

Citizens of the Fort Pickering district, in the southern portion of the city, have formed the Fort Pickering Loyal League, which will engage in the effort to further civic projects of benefit and advantage to the life of that part of the city. Plans will soon be formulated to raise a fund for a wading pool in De Soto park, to be made a reality by wading time for the kids next spring. Harry Kabakoff, 347 Arkansas street, is chairman of the league.

Memphis Public Schools

To Provide Permanent and Ample Funds for the Movement Initiated by the Citizens' League.

The following is a telegram sent by the Citizens' League candidates Sunday to Gov. Roberts. If the request contained in this telegram is granted by Gov. Roberts, he will include the needs of the Memphis schools in his call for a special session of the legislature which he contemplates convening:

"Memphis, Tenn., Oct. 26, 1919. Gov. Albert H. Roberts. Nashville, Tennessee.

"The Board of Education of Memphis is sorely in need of funds with which to increase pay of our school teachers. Legislation can give immediate relief. We therefore urge that you include in your call for extra session of the legislature measures which will remove all doubts by giving City Commission authority to provide funds so that Board of Education may increase pay of teachers at once.
