LITTLE PROSPECT OF LIFTING SALOONS' OPINION

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30. (Sp.)—Although President Wilson has declared he will lift the ban on wartime prohibition as soon as the treaty is ratified by the senate, the prospect of saloons being allowed to reopen in those states where sale of liquor is permitted before Jan. 16, 1920, when national constitutional prohibition takes effect, is none too bright.

In the first place there is no certainty that the treaty will be ratified and if it is such ratification may be in the form of a foreign affairs committee resolution which provides for the concurrence of three other allied nations before it becomes effective.

Austria's Peace Treaty. This course was determined upon in the belief that business interests of the country are insistent upon ratification and it is intimated other ways may be found to prevent the lifting of the ban.

Millions in Liquor.

Late estimates have placed the amount of liquor in bonded warehouses at 66,000,000 gallons, and with the internal revenue tax which is not paid until removal from such warehouse at \$2.40 a gallon, the total amount which the government would receive if the ban is lifted, providing all of that were sold, would be \$422,400,000.

ITALIANS AT PARIS STIRRED BY RUMORS

PARIS, Oct. 30. (By Associated Press.)—Rumors received here that the American government had refused to accept the latest project put forward by Foreign Minister Tittoni for the settlement of the Fiume question caused a display of deep emotion in Italian conference circles in Paris.

Despite the fact that no official confirmation has been received, it is the general sentiment of the Italian delegation that the information is correct and that the delegates are showing disappointment. While the heads of Italian mission maintain their courteous, diplomatic manner, lesser members of the delegation are outspoken, saying the decision would prolong indefinitely the perplexities and anxieties now facing the Italian government.

It is regrettable, said one of the secretaries, that the abnegation with which the Italian government has exposed itself to unpopularity in order to find an acceptable solution of the Adriatic problem or its avowed purpose of maintaining, in spite of all, solidarity with its allies, have not succeeded in avoiding the deception, which now comes from Washington.

HOLMES COUNTY SHIPS TEN CARS OF LIVE STOCK YAZOO CITY, Miss., Oct. 30. (Sp.)—Holmes county has reached a new record in co-operative shipments of live stock, 10 carloads being handled. Of this number seven cars went to market under the supervision of the county farm demonstration agent, and the other three were marketed by individuals.

COMMITTEE TO FORM COTTON ORGANIZATION YAZOO CITY, Miss., Oct. 30. (Sp.)—Messrs. M. M. Brister, J. G. Montgomery and J. J. McTear, of Yazoo county, have been appointed as a temporary committee to attend a later meeting in Jackson, Miss., for the forming of a permanent auxiliary organization of the American Cotton association.

BETTER EXPRESS SERVICE HELENA, Ark., Oct. 30. (Sp.)—W. M. Martin, of the Helena Traffic bureau, returned to Helena from Little Rock where he was in conference with officials of the American Railway Express Co., in regard to better service for this city.

TELEGRAPH BRIEFS

ALEXANDRIA, La.—Clint C. O'Malley, deputy U. S. marshal, was shot and dangerously wounded by J. Y. McVeigh, at Urania, near here, when he sought to arrest McVeigh on a charge of using the mails to defraud. McVeigh escaped.

NEW ORLEANS—Capt. John A. Cotter, supervisor of U. S. inspectors of steam vessels here for 20 years, is dead, aged 73 years. He was born in England and served in the Confederate navy.

NEW YORK—John Wannamaker has been elected chairman of the executive committee of the World's Sunday School league, the Rotary club and the Helena board of trade, looking toward having all in readiness when the time rolls round next year for taking the census.

BUYS MULE BARN. YAZOO CITY, Miss., Oct. 30. (Sp.)—Joseph Fine, of Greencastle, Ind., recently a purchaser of the Kansas plantation near this city, has just closed a deal whereby he becomes the owner of the Wallace Fleming Horse and Mule company barn, lots on Mount street. The consideration was in the neighborhood of \$7,000. Mr. Fine is a practical live stock man and will continue the business.

HELENA WISHES CITY BOUNDARIES EXTENDED

HELENA, Ark., Oct. 30. (Sp.)—The question of extending the boundary lines of Helena was brought up at the regular meeting of the Lion's club. According to present figures compiled the population is said to show only 19,000 when it is confidently believed that with the corporate limits extended to where they should be the number of Helena's population will come nearer being 20,000.

DAYTON, Ohio—A reversible airplane propeller, tested at McCook field, has proved successful. With it planes are brought to a stop within 50 feet. The device will increase the climbing speed 40 per cent and permit an altitude of 50,000 feet to be reached.

NEW YORK—Mrs. Dora Mintz, aged 29, has been asleep three weeks and all attempts to awaken her have failed. Her sleep is believed to be an aftermath of an attack of influenza.

NEW YORK—Col. Richard M. Plunkett, former U. S. marshal of Oklahoma and once marshal of Creede, Col., is dead, aged 58 years, after a long illness of the stomach.

OKLAHOMA CITY—The Farmers' bank of Lambert, Okla., was entered by burglars who picked the vault lock and escaped with \$100 in cash and private papers valued at \$200.

COPENHAGEN—The Lettef press bureau announces that the Allied fleet at Rika, aided by some large warships, is continuing to bombard German positions.
