

CLASH-DIXIE GRID TITLE IN DOUBT

Up to Commodores To Stop Alabama

Unless Vandy Comes Through, Dixie Grid Title Will Not Be Decided Until Thanksgiving Day—Georgia Tech Picked to Win Easily Over Washington and Lee Eleven.

Unless Vanderbilt unexpectedly defeats Alabama, the fight for Southern football honors will hardly be decided before Thanksgiving. The Commodores will play the Crimson in Nashville and a defeat for the latter would set them out of the running for the championship.

Georgia Tech, as yet undefeated in Southern football, will meet the Washington and Lee eleven in Atlanta and comparative scores point to the Golden Tornadoes adding another victory to their string while Mississippi A. & M., the other contender for the Dixie championship on past performances should have an easy victory over the University of Mississippi at Clarksdale.

In the South Atlantic section the big game will be played at Chapel Hill, N. C., between the University of North Carolina and the Virginia institute. The former team has not been defeated this year by a Southern eleven, although held to a tie last Saturday by the University of Tennessee.
