CREST IN RIVER RISE HERE; FALL PREDICTED

The crest of the present rise in the Mississippi river reached Memphis Monday morning when the government gauge registered 30.8 feet. The official prediction given out by the local office of the weather bureau indicates that this stage will be maintained for about 24 hours and the river will then fall. The crest at Helena will be 28.2 feet, the official forecast declares. On Monday morning the gauge registered 37.1 feet at Memphis, a rise of 2.7 feet was recorded at Cairo.
The figures above by the official government instrument Monday indicate that the forecast made a week ago by S. C. Emory, local forecaster, has been substantiated. He stated that the stage at Memphis would be about 31 feet. There is no indication at this time that the river will go any above that stage.

C. E. SPELLERS HERO IN STORE ROBBERY

Police hoped Monday morning to have under arrest before night the second of the two robbers who Saturday night killed a customer and robbed a store No. 1, East Main boulevard and Gillie avenue.
The capture of a man said to have been the robber occurred at 10:30 minutes after the robbery Saturday night. Credit for the capture and return of the man to the store was given to Charles E. Spellers, manager of the store. Armed only with a pocket watch, Spellers, who was the only man in the store at the time, was out-distanced on foot, he hailed a passing automobile and caught up with H. H. Wade, 25 1/2 South Front street, who was in an alley, Spellers, fearing the man had the pistol with which he had executed the robbery, fired a shot into the eye with the weight. Wade then begged for mercy. From Wade's mouth came the \$121.60. Wade, who said he recently was discharged from the army, told police that he was a driver for the Yellow Cab company, but that he had no knowledge of his companion's identity.
Two men walked into the grocery just before closing time. One produced a pistol and aimed Spellers, Edward Haden and C. C. Hudson, clerks. The other, armed with a knife, rifled the cash drawer. Both men fled. Spellers and the clerk pursued. Wade is charged with the pistol capture. Wade is charged with highway robbery.

SMELL ON TRIAL FOR EASTHAM'S DEATH

Sam Snell, 53, aged logger, residing near Woodstock, is on trial for murder in the first degree in the Second criminal court, charged with the murder of Frank Eastham, 37, on Dec. 1, 1919.
Snell the father of six children, one of whom he served in the army, was in France when the great war in which he was killed in a huge battle with Eastham when the shooting occurred. Snell claims that he and Eastham were trying to locate a mad dog which had been produced by the neighborhood. They found the dog, he claims, and as he sought to kill the rabid beast, it caught in the baggy seat, was discharged and accidentally killed Eastham.
Sunday Raymond J. Snell, the soldier-son of the defendant, walked 48 miles from Memphis and back to get money for the lawyer retained by his father's case.
Five jurors had qualified to hear the case at noon Monday, but one of the cases probably will last all day. Walter Dugger is Snell's attorney.
