

COAL PROFITS

Former Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo, while no longer in office, has shown the government authorities how to come at the profits of the coal operators—a secret that has been carefully guarded ever since the coal question has become acute.

The public at large knows that McAdoo is not a fool, and the fact that he has aroused the ire of the coal operators shows that his words do carry weight, and that they have no answer to them.

According to the Christian Science Monitor, one of the most reliable newspapers published anywhere, "The net incomes of mine owners in 1917 showed an increase of 1015.34 per cent over those of 1916, and incomes generally, recorded under the head of coal, showed a corresponding increase the same year of 5983.62 per cent."

With the miners on one side and the operators on the other the public is the tertium quid and is ground between the upper and nether millstones.

The controversy will ultimately bring out the facts in the case. It will not do to put all the blame on the miners offhand, or claim that they are being misled by foreign anarchists.

"WHERE ARE WE AT?"

A few years ago a provincial statesman arose in his place in congress and in authoritative tones demanded to know: "Where are we at?"

Each day there arises some new difficulty more puzzling than the other.

Now we have the difficulty of the silver dollar. Whether you have the dollar or not does not enter into the consideration.

The question is that the dollar will only purchase about 45 per cent of its normal value, and that a dollar's worth of bullion is worth more than a dollar coin.

As a result the business interests are in such shape that they are unable to do the business required of them on account of the lack of one and two-dollar bills.

Practically all silver dollars have been withdrawn from circulation. The reason is apparent. As soon as silver advances beyond \$1.29 the silver certificate that can draw silver from our treasury on presentation is at a premium; or, in other words, one may take a silver dollar today and sell it as bullion for more than the dollar is worth as a circulating medium.

During the past two years there has been a heavy demand for silver, principally from the Oriental countries, which resulted in an exportation of silver from April 23 to Dec. 31, 1918, amounting to \$258,209,000.

From Jan. 1 to Oct. 31, 1919, exports of silver from the country amounted to \$167,335,000.

The demand for silver has resulted in a marked increase in the price of silver bullion, and the quotations have gone as high as \$1.37, and have steadily been considerably above \$1.29, which is the coinage value.


