HARDWOOD LUMBER MARKERS' ANNUAL PROGRAM READY

Several Hundred Delegates From Many States to Rally Here for Convention of Association.

The program for the second annual convention of the American Hardwood Manufacturers' association, which has just come off the press, promises an intensely interesting and profitable two days to the members of the association, both from the standpoint of business and pleasure. The convention will be held at the Hotel Chisca Dec. 16 and 17. The delegates to the convention, who will number several hundred and come from every hardwood lumber point in the country, except the far West, will be welcomed to Memphis by William H. Fitzhugh, president of the Chamber of Commerce, at the opening session at 10:30 a. m. on the morning of Dec. 16. Mr. Fitzhugh will be answered by M. W. Stark, of Columbus, Ohio, first vice-president of the association, who will be followed by R. M. Carrier, of Searsville, Miss., president, who will deliver his annual address. The reports of J. M. Pritchard, secretary-manager; of R. E. Darnell, treasurer; and F. R. Gadd, manager of statistics, will then be read. Coming after these reports will be the reports of the following committees: Advertising, C. L. Harrison, chairman; oak department, E. A. Lang, and gum department, H. B. Weiss; assessment, John W. McClure, chairman; membership, W. A. Hanson, chairman; reports and statistics, M. W. Stark, chairman; inspection rules, B. F. Dulweber, chairman; terms, S. B. Anderson, chairman; cost, W. B. Burke, chairman; legal department, R. E. Jordan, chairman; labor, A. C. Lange, chairman; foreign trade relations, J. W. Mayhew, chairman; cottonwood, D. E. Gilbert, chairman; governing committee commercial rotary gum department, G. W. Sparks, chairman; governing committee, hardwood department, R. L. Muse, chairman; and governing committee, Rotary Cut Box Lumber Manufacturers' association, E. B. Martin, chairman.

Will Elect Officers.
Gen. L. C. Boyle, of Washington, counsel for the association, will speak at 1:30 o'clock, when the afternoon session of the first day is convened. Mr. Carrier will preside over the meetings as the chief executive officer. The morning of the second day will be devoted to a meeting of the open competition plan membership, at which M. W. Stark, chairman, and F. R. Gadd, manager of statistics, will officiate.

At the opening of the afternoon session Murray Springs, of Chicago, will speak on the "Relationship Between Trade Extension and Trade Efficiency." The election of officers for the ensuing year will be conducted later in the afternoon, just before adjournment. A meeting of the board of directors will be held at 5 p. m. the last act of the annual meeting.

The big entertainment feature of the convention will be started Tuesday evening, when a private boxing program will be given for the delegates at the Phoenix Athletic club, starting at 8 o'clock. Riley Wilson, of West Virginia, will be master of ceremonies at this affair and Billy Haack will officiate as referee. The program of matches promises some worth-while action.

The first bout will be a battle royal between five negroes. This will be followed by a four-round go between Bunting Arthur and Kid Joseph, Kid King and Kid Black will next entertain the guests with a six-round scrap at 15 pounds. The Fighting Editor and Young Demmesey, boxing rounds at 15 pounds, will follow the black pugilists. The last bout will be between Patsy Hagan, of the U. S. navy, and Bobby Hayes, of Memphis. They will box eight rounds at 125 pounds.

Brynum's negro band will furnish the musical entertainment.

STATE OF MORELOS IS COMPLETELY PACIFIED
MEXICO CITY, Dec. 10.—Complete pacification of the state of Morelos by the capture of seven self-styled "generals" has been reported to the war department by Gen. Pablo Gonzales who is in charge of federal military operations in the southern part of the republic. The capture of the "generals" was effected at Huautla after three leaders with more than a thousand men had been cornered in the hills for 15 days. Gen. Gonzales stated that valuable archives, dealing in detail with the exploits of Emiliano Zapata before he was killed, were taken.




