VOCATIONAL SCHOOL PRINTS CURRICULA

A 52-page booklet containing the course of study of the Memphis public schools, grammar grades, has just come off the press at the Vocational high school and copies have been supplied to Prof. Wharton S. Jones, superintendent of schools. The booklet contains the complete course of study for the grammar grades, and was designed, printed and bound by the pupils in the vocational school print shop, under the direction of the instructors in that department.

Prof. Jones is very proud of the work, and typographically it is a splendid piece of work. The introductory contains the following: "A course of study for a system of schools is never complete. Changes, additions and eliminations must be made from time to time to keep in line with the best thought in educational development."

"This course of study is built around the three H's—the Head, the Heart and the Hand. The head refers to the academic side of the child's life. The hand refers to the manual activities—such as drawing, organized games and plays, and the heart refers to the social activities as develop a sound and self-concept. The heart refers to the social side of the child's life. The hand refers to the manual activities. Children should be taught the fundamentals of social conduct. Such instruction has always been incidentally taught, but in this course a serious effort has been attempted to have it taught systematically. TEST CASE OF USURY CHARGES

Counsel for Loan Companies and State's Attorney Reach an Agreement.

Harry T. Holman, attorney for certain loan companies in usury cases and S. O. Bates, state's attorney, late Thursday agreed to try one of the cases and have it argued to the supreme court as a test case.

The first case charging usury to be tried since the recent crusade against the alleged "loan shark" was that of A. P. McWhite, of the Shelby Brokerage company, the prosecutor being W. B. Jones. The case was tried several weeks ago in the Second criminal court resulting in a mistrial. McWhite, through the attorney, Harry T. Holman and Jones, the prosecutor, through the state's attorney, have agreed that the case be called to trial after the holidays; that the jury be instructed to return a verdict of guilty if the defendant asks for a new trial which will of course be overruled by Judge Harsh in order that the case may be appealed for the purposes of the test.

The question for the supreme court to decide is whether the loan made to Jones was a loan made for the interest or whether or not Jones sold his salary to the brokerage company for a stipulated sum or a discount, as it were.

There are about 20 cases against loan companies charging usury now pending in the criminal courts. These will be held up pending the decision of the higher court on the Jones-McWhite test case.

CINEMA OF CRIME REFLECTED UPON POLICE BLOTTER

A general drive against morphine addicts has been ordered by Police Chief Joe Burney, in an effort to stop the activities of burglars and sneak thieves. An even dozen, additional arrests Thursday night and before noon Friday police had rounded up a half dozen more.
