DOCTORS INSIST UPON RIGHTS AT CITY'S HOSPITAL

Medical Society Votes to Oppose Ordinance Granting Full Control to University of Tennessee Medical College.

The ordinance granting complete and absolute control of the Memphis General Hospital, owned by the city of Memphis, to the College of Medicine of the University of Tennessee for a period of 20 years, will not be passed in its present form if efforts of a majority of the members of the Memphis and Shelby County Medical Society can prevent it.

The society, at a special meeting called to consider the ordinance and the proposed contract Monday night, voted 73 to 24 against it. There were probably 120 members present when the meeting began, but a number were called to attend patients before the vote was taken. The vote undoubtedly correctly expresses the sentiment of the majority of the medical profession in Memphis.

That sentiment was expressed forcibly by Dr. Frank A. Jones, who, although he has been a member of the college faculty for 20 years, including his service with the old Memphis Hospital Medical College, said he would rather see the University of Tennessee close the doors of its Memphis branches than see the rights of the physicians and taxpayers of Memphis surrendered under the ordinance in its present form. Dr. Jones added that he proposed to resign from the faculty of the college, as he differed so radically in his views on this question from other members of the faculty.

Dr. Jones in Lead

Dr. Frank A. Jones, resigned some time ago, after more than a quarter century of service to the college faculty, under much the same conditions. In speaking Monday night he said that he opposed the ordinance, because it is neither justice or right that the college faculty, through the dean, shall be given the authority to appoint members of the city hospital staff, the year round, and that no such authority is given the dean of any medical college elsewhere.

He also pointed out that it is well known that the educational control of the American Medical Association has decreed that the medical college in Memphis shall be destroyed, and that no more than our medical colleges shall be permitted to exist in the entire South.

Dr. N. P. Caldwell's ears must have turned Monday night. Dr. Caldwell is secretary and the moving spirit in the educational control of the college. Dr. Jones said that Dr. Caldwell is unfair, arbitrary and has worked for years with the dean who controls the medical department of Vanderbilt university at Nashville to build up that institution and to make conditions under which no other medical college in the state can live. He said plainly that he holds Dr. Caldwell in the most profound contempt and his sentiments were evidently shared by a number of the others at the meeting, for none defended him.

Activities Among Memphis Negroes

Memphis has some of the best schools and churches to be found in the South among negroes, and when it comes to business, there are banks, stores and many kinds of commercial activities. There is room for improvement, which all of us must admit, but having gotten off our nerve and settled down to that which is sane and practical, let a put Memphis on the map as never before. The field is fertile, the time is ripe and the negroes are awaiting the "Blind old rick in the new." Count me "for Memphis."

Dr. Morgan's Plea Vain

Dr. H. A. Morgan, president of the university, who came to Memphis specially to address the meeting and to get in touch with the sentiment locally as to the proposed ordinance, spoke briefly. He said that unless the medical college can control absolutely the staff appointments, there is every probability that the rating of the college will be reduced in rating from AA 1 to "B," and that nothing could then be done but to close the college and abandon the attempt to build up in Memphis a great medical school.

Bolton Smith had previously read a telegram from Dr. Caldwell reiterating that any medical college in "Class A" must either own or control a hospital. Dr. E. C. Elliott merely stressed anew the fact that if the contract is not made, the college will probably have to close.

Dr. Andrews, in reply, read a similar telegram, but said that the word "control," in his opinion, need not be so interpreted, and that as a matter of law, under the city charter, no one can control, no one should control, except the duly constituted authorities, the board of trustees of the General Hospital.

The vote was taken by ballot on Monday night. Dr. J. L. Andrews had been announced, Drs. J. L. Jones, Frank A. Jones, Bryce Fontaine, W. E. Still, and others were named to present the action of the society to the city commission.

May Close School


