Barbarian Feels, Doesn't Analyze Symphony Concert

Even for the heart of one saddened by the approaching fall of the doom and death of wine and many of those depictions concerning which so much really beautiful in music has been written, even to the sensibilities of one who longs to know rather than one who really does know, the intricacies, the technique, the machinery of music, there is such a thing, the personality of Eugene Ysaie, the picturing of the scenes of his wizard of strings and wind conjured up in the brilliant concert at the Lyric theater Wednesday night, linger next day and will continue to linger, no doubt, for many, many days.

The conductor himself, eloquent even in his haughty, consummate musician first of all limbs his personality on the retina of the imagination as a figure of distinction, not without a touch of nobility to his dignity and consummate care in playing upon his orchestra as the organist missing over his keys. Salvoes and the tread of those heroes who stemmed the Prussian tide in his native Belgium could be heard and seen marching to the strains of Saint-Saens' "March Heroique," which opened the program of the Cincinnati Symphony orchestra.

A tear, a waft of the handkerchief by a dancing-eyed girl from an old Flemish house with its remnant of a hat from the ranks might be seen and felt as the reeds, the oboes and an occasional trumpet's call serve themselves into the fabric of the composition. All the moods, all the colors flashed across the vision, Schubert's B minor symphony, colors, kaleidoscopic, moods, vague, undetermined, indefinable yearnings, with the feeling of possible disaster vibrated through this number. Perhaps it was chosen to lead up to the exalted realization of the cathedral tones of the "Hymn to St. Cecilia" Gounod's majestic blending of harmony to the incidental solo of concertmeister Emil Heerman. Cathedral tones from the orchestra from which settling welled up from the nave, the clear soprano stimulated by the tones of the violin in the hands of a man in love with his instrument and with his work—a hymn of praise and supplication, ending in the diamond cut clear young cry of a soul of purity.
