**BLAMES PACKERS FOR INCREASE IN PRICES**

NEWARK, N. J., Jan. 23.—The high cost of living since 1918 has been due largely to five great packing concerns whose profits from 1915 to 1917 included more than \$192,000,000, as compared with \$10,000,000 in the preceding years, William B. Colver, chairman of the federal trade commission, declares in an address delivered before the Atlantic coast conference of the National Consumers League here. Mr. Colver was unable to attend.

A representative of Swift & Co. of Chicago, later read a telegram from Mr. Swift in which he denied that the packers had been responsible for increasing the cost of living and declared that Mr. Colver's statement showed "an other disregard for facts." It was asserted that the price of meat had risen only 50 per cent since 1913, while the average food increases had been 102 per cent.

**GIRL KILLS STUDENT; DAD HAS AUTO WRECK**

RALPHIGH, N. C., Jan. 23.—Seven hours after 12-year-old Lillian Perrell had accidentally shot and killed Allan Swain, Winston-Salem student of Buies Creek academy, at Buies Creek, N. C., E. S. Perrell, father of the girl, drove his big automobile into five-passenger sedan, four miles from Raleigh, yesterday, slightly injuring all its passengers, including Prof. Campbell, head of Buies Creek academy, and five students who were accompanying the remains of young Swain on their way to Petersburg, Va., to his home.

**ON AERIAL HONEYMOON.**

TULSA, Okla., Jan. 23.—D. A. McIntyre and Rev. R. Robert Crawford left here yesterday in a Curtiss Oriole plane for Glendive, Mont., on what will become an aerial honeymoon journey. McIntyre and Miss Jeanette Donaldson, of Sydney, Mont., will be married by Rev. Crawford, himself an aviator. The couple will then make a long journey down the coast, across the border and back to Tulsa, while Crawford will remain in Montana preaching to woodmen and ranchers, using an airplane to travel about the isolated country.

## CANCEL N. Y. MEETING TO PROTECT ARMENIA

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—A mass meeting which was to have been held at Carnegie hall this evening to urge the administration to take steps to prevent the powers from cutting up Armenia has been cancelled at the request of officials in Washington, it is stated. Announcement of the cancellation by the American committee for the independence of Armenia, of which James W. Gerard is chairman, said:

"Mr. Gerard intimated that semi-official information received at the office of the committee had suggested the advisability of cancelling the proposed meeting subject to future development."

"Mr. Gerard declined to discuss who had asked that the meeting be called off and declared he did not know the reason for the request."

"We did not want to embarrass the government in any negotiations that might now be in progress," he added.

**SOUTH CAROLINA SOLONS REJECT SUFFRAGE LAW**

COLUMBIA, S. C., Jan. 23.—The house of representatives of the South Carolina general assembly yesterday by a vote of 33 to 21, adopted a concurrent resolution offered by Representative James H. Hart of York county, rejecting the federal amendment for woman's suffrage. The resolution now goes to the senate for consideration.

Parliamentary leaders of the general assembly disagree as to what effect the passage of the resolution will have. It is contended by some members that a joint resolution proposing ratification of the amendment may be considered by the house regardless of the action taken today.

**TWO VOTERS PASS BIG \$300,000 BOND ISSUE**

CLEVELAND, O., Jan. 23.—Two long voters in the Shaker Heights village board for building new schools at a special election yesterday, the county board of elections announced after completing tabulations of the ballots.

No other voter braved the deep snow. None of the election officers lived in the district.
