The second trio of children was born Monday and all are well. When the first triplets arrived 15 months ago Mr. and Mrs. Livingston appealed to President Wilson to name them. Failing to get a reply from the national executive they called upon the governor of Alabama to help them.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—Because Francisco Villa "reserves all rights to robbery and loot for himself" his operations are looked upon with favor by the population, the senate committee investigating the Mexican situation was told today by Henry H. Knox, a New York mining engineer.

Mr. Knox said he had 20 years experience in Mexico.

"Villa establishes a certain justice," Mr. Knox said, "whenever he gains control of an area, and represses all looting, robbery and drunkenness. His first act is to close the saloons.

REALTY MEN WILL DISCUSS EQUALIZATION

John M. Dean, president of the Memphis Real Estate Dealers' Association, has called a special meeting of the association for 12:30 p. m. Wednesday at the Chamber of Commerce to discuss a plan whereby the members of the association may cooperate with the state board of equalization for bringing about a fair and equitable adjustment of the assessments of Shelby county property, which in many instances are known to be far out of line with their actual values.

A definite plan of procedure to this end has been worked out and will be presented to the real estate men for their approval. This plan was worked out in accordance with a suggestion from the state board.

Mr. Leathan, chief tax statistician, recently wrote to Mr. Dean, thanking him heartily for the attitude the association had assumed toward the board, and expressing the need of the cooperation of such men as Mr. Dean and such organizations as the Memphis Real Estate Dealers' Association.

"We intend to keep in mind one purpose only," Mr. Leathan said, "and that is to do exact justice, not only as between individuals but as between the counties. If we can secure the cooperation of such organizations as yours throughout Tennessee, we will give this state an assessment that will stand as a monument to every one of us connected with it."
