Members of the flower mart committee of the Nineteenth Century club, of which Miss Mary Love is chairman, held a meeting on Monday afternoon to discuss plans for the annual flower mart in Court square, April 17, which was chosen as the date of the affair, which will be more than usually attractive. Mrs. M. T. Roush has been appointed as chairman to have charge of the decorations of the booth. Mrs. Hugh Haxley will be chairman in charge of the sale of flowers by the young girls on the streets and will also see some of the furniture dealers to secure an exhibit of garden furniture. Mrs. Palmer Farnsworth will attend those in the Butryn community in participating in the event. Mrs. A. B. DeLoach, who has been in charge of the flower mart for a number of years and by whom it was first given as a feature of the civic department of citizens of the flower mart committee, is a part, and other prominent club members will lend their aid in making the event a success.
