

TEACHERS, PAY MORE
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SAYS W. H. TAFT

MEMPHIS, Ala., March 18. (Sp.)—President William Howard Taft addressed a large and representative audience here Monday night at the Tennessee theater, which remained open until noon and was driven over the principal streets of the city and to Wilson Dam and nitrate plant No. 2. MERIDIAN WINS IN RATE CASE DISPUTE

The Meridian Miss. March 18. (Sp.)—The Meridian traffic bureau has won a complete victory in its assault on interstate commerce rates, the department announcing that the commission had ruled that class and commodity rates from Ohio and Mississippi river crossings, Chicago and related points were unduly prejudicial to Meridian and unduly preferential to New Orleans, Mobile and Vicksburg. Class rates from Chicago, Cairo, St. Louis and Louisville, and rates on grain from Cairo and St. Louis were found unduly preferential to New Orleans, Vicksburg and Natchez. The decision is a complete victory for Manager B. W. Hayward of the traffic bureau.
