

KRANZ IN JACKSON TO DIRECT FIGHT ON TUBERCULOSIS

JACKSON, Tenn., March 18. (Sp.)—J. P. Kranz, of Nashville, secretary of the Tennessee Anti-Tuberculosis Association, was in Jackson today for a conference with Chairman Thomas F. Cade and other members of the local executive committee of the anti-tuberculosis association relative to the appropriation of the funds raised in the recent campaign in Jackson. Approximately \$1,000 was reported to the central office from Jackson, states Dr. Kranz, and this money, together with any other assets that may be held by the local association, will be expended in Jackson and Madison county in furthering a plan adopted by the Jackson committee to stamp out the great white plague.

It was announced by Dr. Kranz that an educational nurse would probably be sent to Jackson to assist in the treatment of affected patients and promote a community-wide educational program with a view of preventing a spread of the malady.

Dr. Kranz is also interested in the civic and social surveys that are now being conducted here under the direction of A. F. Kuhlman, director of surveys. He addressed the health committee, now engaged in the survey, which met last night in the office of Dr. C. B. Crittenden, field director of the Tennessee state board of health.

A new departure that has heretofore been unannounced has been made by the State Anti-Tuberculosis association. Dr. Kranz. This is the addition of a negro auxiliary to the staff of the association. The promoters of the movement recognize that extensive work is necessary among the negro race in order to successfully combat the disease. Prof. Ambrose Caliber, of the Fisk university, has been added to the staff as managing director of the eradication campaign against tuberculosis to be conducted among the negroes.

A negro nurse has also been engaged and will work with Prof. Caliber in each county of the state.

SHIPPING BOARD BUYS OIL SUPPLY

WASHINGTON, March 18.—The shipping board has announced that contracts have been signed for more than 12,000,000 barrels of fuel oil for delivery at Atlantic and gulf ports during the next six months. The contracts, which were made at public sale, range from \$1.27 to \$1.56 per barrel.

The Mexican Petroleum corporation accepted a contract to deliver 211,000 barrels per month at Galveston for \$1.34 per barrel, 110,000 barrels at Port Arthur for \$1.45, 107,000 barrels at New Orleans for \$1.40 and 512,000 barrels at Jacksonville at \$1.50.

One contract was signed with the Atlantic Gulf Oil corporation calling for the delivery of 2,800,000 barrels of "light Mexican crude" at \$1 per barrel, plus export charges, to be delivered at Tecumseh, Mexico.

The Standard Oil Company of New Jersey signed two contracts, the first calling for delivery at New York, Baltimore and Norfolk of 2,215,000 barrels at \$2.07 per barrel, but this price will include the government transportation charge of 80 cents a barrel. The second contract with this company covered topping, storage and re-delivery at New York of 2,800,000 barrels of fuel oil at \$1.66, which price also included the government transportation charge.

Murphy Recital Brings Delight To Lovers Of Harmony

With a voice of wonderful sweetness and a personality that will win friends by the myriad Lambert Murphy, again by his low to local favor at the Goodwyn Institute Wednesday night and at once became a crime favorite. The audience was given a treat such as one rarely has the opportunity of enjoying. To many the occasion was an event, unusual in its character, white to others, more accustomed to hearing the big artists, it was one of the most delightful concerts of the season. Murphy has a soul and a vocal ability which makes him one of those rare attractions whose coming again is anxiously awaited.

His voice has timbre and color and its clarity and sonority bring delight to the ear, whether trained to higher appreciation or just so that harmony and rhythm can be enjoyed. There is a wealth of finish to his tones and he displays thorough knowledge of nuance, his pianissimo work of the higher register being especially pleasing, without suggestion of the falsetto. Diction is an art of which he has become a master, enabling his auditors to better appreciate the subject matter about which he sings, and so well has he learned to breathe and control his tones that singing appears absolutely without effort.

It is above all a singer of heart songs and ballads, though he makes them classics. As a concert recitalist he is one of the most satisfactory white here, and after all that is a realm of music which requires unusual talent. It is not often one sees an audience so enthusiastic as the one Wednesday evening. While Murphy makes no pretense of being dramatic and rarely appreciates what nature has en-


