Seeks To Set Aside Former Judgment

Seeking to have a magistrate's judgment set aside, so that it can collect on a debt, the Miller Rubber company of New York, together with T. F. Kelley and A. W. Newson, Charles J. Haase and I. F. Bendorff, filed a bill in chancery court Wednesday against O. H. Perry, sheriff of Shelby county. Ira H. Saint, deputy sheriff, Martha Key and John L. Key; George B. Coleman, justice of the peace, and S. E. Castleman, Attorneys A. B. Puryear and Elias Gates represent the complainants.

The bill alleges that the Keys gave a trust deed to certain property on Cox street to Haase and Bendorff, and a second trust deed to Kelly and Newson, to secure debt of \$88.52 which the rubber company alleges the Keys owed to it. The Keys now live in Arkansas, the bill alleges.

When Haase and Bendorff sold the property to collect on their mortgage, there remained the sum of \$1,936.95 in their possession. Before the rubber company and its agents, Kelly and Newson, could act, the bill alleges that Castleman obtained a judgment against the Keys, before Justice Coleman, and that execution on the judgment was served on Haase by another deputy sheriff, and that Haase returned that he had on hand \$1,936.95 belonging to the Keys.

Coleman rendered a judgment for \$99.99 against Haase, the bill alleges, and Haase paid over the money when the sheriff threatened to levy on Haase's property. The complainants are asking for an injunction to restrain Sheriff Perry and Deputy Saint from disbursing the money they got from Haase, until the Miller Rubber company shall have been satisfied in its debt on the second mortgage for \$83.52.

JUDGE THREATENS TO SEND BOY TO PEN

"If you ever appear before me again on a similar charge, I am going to send you to the penitentiary," said Judge J. Ed Richards in First division of criminal court Wednesday to George Dunaway, young white man, who just had pleaded guilty to stealing a bicycle worth \$15. Judge Richards then accepted the recommendation of Attorney-General Sam O. Bates that Dunaway be sent to the workhouse for six months, and he instructed a jury to find that verdict on the defendant's plea of guilty.
