

LEAGUE LEADERS OPEN ROAD TRIP

Meet Kid Eberfeld's Travelers Wednesday in First of Four-Game Series—Tribe's Winning Streak Broken by Pels.

After a very successful stay on friendly soil and with their winning record intact, the Peleas today left for Memphis to meet the Eberfeld's Travelers in the first of a four-game series.

Manager McCloskey said he would use either Hugh Canavan or Pat Albrit, Kid Eberfeld, who on Tuesday, said Rube Robinson, a left-hander, would hurl for the Peleas.

The game was close until the last two innings, when both teams started hammering the ball. The Peleas scored three runs in the eighth and five in the ninth, while the Chicks scored three in both the eighth and ninth rounds.

Bill Thwaitt was taken out of the box after Sunday's game to start the ninth, and Canavan went in.

It would have been a wise move to have lifted Meyers from the box. The most valuable man New Orleans had all day.

Thwaitt is being worked too often, which is one of the reasons he proved ineffective.
