GIRLS ARE BURGLARS.

NEW YORK, July 12.—Two of the youngest "female burglars" on record appeared in police court in Brooklyn today, when two sisters, aged 11 and 12, pleaded guilty to a charge of juvenile delinquency. They were arrested in a Brooklyn home after they are alleged to have forced an entry and packed \$1,000 worth of silverware and jewelry in a suit case.

Plan Mass Meeting For Young People

A mass meeting in which all the Christian Endeavor societies and the Epworth leagues of the city will unite, to be held in the Idlewild Presbyterian church August 2, was planned Monday night at a meeting of the Christian Endeavor union at the McLemore Avenue Christian church. The purpose of the mass meeting is to bring about closer fellowship between the societies of the two young people's organizations. The City Epworth League union and the City Christian Endeavor union, each are made up of about 15 societies. Two new Endeavor societies were admitted to the city union Monday night, from the Westminster Presbyterian church and from the Holy Trinity Episcopal church. Leo E. Glass, president of the city union, presided.

CONFESSED ROBBER OF I. C. TRAIN SENTENCED

CHICAGO, July 12.—Richard P. Smyth, confessed accomplice of Horace Walton, killed in a pistol fight with a policeman after he had robbed an Illinois Central train of \$75,000, and shot a policeman, pleaded guilty before Federal Judge Landis yesterday. Smyth was indicted on two counts, after he surrendered to postal inspectors in St. Joseph, Mo., May 16. One indictment named him as an accomplice, and the other charged him with aiding in his possession money stolen from the United States mails. Judge Landis sentenced Smyth to 18 months in the National School for Boys in Washington, D. C.


