

### MRS. CATT WILL STAY IN NASHVILLE

#### Will Fight for Suffrage Until Vote Is Taken at Special Session.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., July 21. (Sp.)—In response to the request of all the various Tennessee groups of unaffiliated political views but who are united in favor of ratification of the federal woman suffrage amendment, Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the National American Woman Suffrage association, has consented to remain in the state to direct the ratification campaign until after the convening of the special session of the legislature. Gov. Roberts has restated to Mrs. Catt the pledge he made some weeks ago to call a session of the legislature on August 9.

Mrs. Catt, who came to Nashville for a few days' stay to look over the ground, made the following statement:

"My decision to remain here must not be construed as indicating any doubt about Tennessee being the 36th state. I find all the interests of the state anxious for that proud distinction. I feel, however, that a spirited battle is before us and that we must enlist in it the support of all men and women who desire victory.

Definite campaign plans will be outlined within a few days when Mrs. George Fort Milton, of Chattanooga, president of the Tennessee League of Women Voters, returns to the state from the Democratic national convention and can confer with Mrs. Catt, chairman of the league's ratification committee.

Mrs. Catt says that in any event the campaign will be conducted in broad lines to secure the cooperation of those of all factions and of all political parties. She stated: "We expect the success of the Democratic party in the legislature and also of the considerable Republican minority. The poll that is nearly completed indicates that we may expect such support and that victory will be sure."

### BLUE MOUNTAIN NOTED FOR BABY POPULATION

BLUE MOUNTAIN, Miss., July 21. (Sp.)—On the first day of the Tipton county "Better Baby Clinic" which is in session here and which will continue for six days, about 100 little tots were examined by the experts brought into the county for this purpose.

According to the 1910 census this county has 4,000 babies and the population of less than 16,000. Most of the children examined on the first day were from the rural communities. On the first three days the clinic will be held in Ripley, the county capital, but for convenience to the public it will later be moved to the city and the county.

The bill was filed by United States District Attorney W. D. Kyser. It is alleged that the company shipped to Chicago 18 dozen quail, the crates being marked "oysters." It is a violation of section 243 of the United States penal code to ship quail.

### TATE COUNTY SCHOOLS TO HOLD JOINT MEETING

SENATORIA, Miss., July 21. (Sp.)—County Superintendent Ira G. Allen has called a joint meeting of the trustees of the consolidated schools of the county, to be held at the county school board for Thursday, July 22. State superintendent of education, W. F. Bond, supervisor of rural schools, H. M. Ivy, and F. J. Hubbard, supervisor of vocational schools, will be present.

This is a get-together meeting of all the school interests of the county. It is the purpose of the superintendent to have the consolidated school adopt a uniform course of study and length of term.

There were several new laws enacted by the last legislature touching the regulation of the schools and these new laws will be discussed; among them is the new compulsory school law.

### POLICE SEEK NEGRO GIRL.


