BROUGH REPUDIATES POWELL'S CANDIDACY

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., July 27. (Sp.)—Gov. Charles H. Brough, in a scathing repudiation of the candidacy of Smead Powell, of Camden, for governor today announced he had deserted Mr. Powell and urged his defeat in the primary Aug. 10. Gov. Brough did not say when he would support. He charged that Mr. Powell was insincere and that his entire campaign had been one of insincerity.

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y., July 27.—After a night spent in informal conferences between party leaders, preparations were made today for the opening of the unofficial Republican convention, at noon when its 11 candidates for nomination for governor.
