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## EMANCIPATION DAY DRAWS BIG CROWD

Thirty coaches, operated in two special trains, were required to handle the crowd that took advantage of the Illinois Central railroad excursion to Paducah Tuesday night on account of Emancipation day celebration here.

From Memphis alone 1,022 tickets were sold, and upon arrival at Paducah Wednesday morning 1,232 passengers were on board.

The first section left Memphis at 11 p.m. and was operated as a through train, with only one or two stops between here and Paducah. The second section left 10 minutes later and was operated as a local train. A round fare of \$3.25, including tax, was made for the trip. This was the first low-fare excursion that has been operated out of Memphis in several years.

The Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Louis railroad operated a special excursion train out of Jackson, Tenn., to Paducah, leaving Jackson at 6:15 a.m. Wednesday.

## CRYSTAL SPRINGS KICKS ABOUT CENSUS RETURNS

CRYSTAL SPRINGS, Miss., Aug. 10 (Sp.)—The citizens of Crystal Springs, Miss., are kicking about the census returns for the town. They are very much dissatisfied and displeased at the census report showing the population of the town just published. The report shows the population to be 1,295, which is an error.

Two years ago the mayor and board of aldermen ordered a census taken in order to ascertain the number of educable children in the town and the report taken then, which was very carefully taken, showed there to be 1,600 whites and negroes in town, and one Chinaman. Since that time a great number of people have moved into the town.
