

### SOVIETS' INFLUENCE WANING, U. S. HEARS

#### Radical Labor Reported Dis- illusioned and Quitting Reds

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—Intimations have been received by the state department that the radical labor element of the principal European countries are becoming divorced from Bolshevism and that the influence of the soviet government in Russia will not be felt much longer in political affairs of the nations of Europe. It was stated on high authority that open avowals of the departure of European labor from the paths of Bolshevism were soon to be expected.

Officials of the department declined to specify from what countries these intimations had been received, but it was made clear that Great Britain, Italy, and to a lesser degree, France, already were experiencing a revulsion of Bolshevism among the radical labor elements which have opposed any move on the part of their governments against Bolshevism in Russia.

The fact that the labor classes of Europe have become thoroughly informed of the practical working of Bolshevism has been a factor in the state department. The radical element in labor in the United States, it was said by a high official, is not so well informed of the manner and methods of Bolshevism as their colleagues of Europe, which accounts for the protests they have made against the attitude of the United States toward Bolshevism in Russia.

### MRS. THERESA LAGUZZI DIES; NATIVE OF ITALY

Following an illness of several weeks, Mrs. Theresa Laguzzi, aged 73, died at her home, 101 North Auburndale street, Wednesday afternoon. She was a native of Italy and had been a resident of America for about 40 years.

She is survived by her daughter, Corinne Laguzzi, and one son, John Laguzzi. The funeral was held Thursday morning from the residence with requiem mass at Sacred Heart church. Burial was in Calvary cemetery.



When Gardner interfered, Thomas shot three times at him, he alleged, with no results except to arouse the anger of Gardner to the extent that he took the gun away from him and gave him a crack over the head which entered him into the General hospital for treatment. He was later arrested and brought to the police station and locked up.
