DEMOCRATS PAN ACTIVE CAMPAIGN TO PARDON VOTERS

Speakers Will Enliven Legislative Race—Delegation in Favor of More Returns for Taxes Paid to State.

The Shelby Democratic Executive committee was engaged Saturday in the selection of a speaking committee to look after the speaking interests of the Democratic candidates for the legislature.

Following the election, according to Walter Chandler, one of the candidates for governor from Shelby county, the delegation, if elected, proposes to hold meetings at some centrally located point from time to time and invite the public to assemble with them to discuss the various issues that will be before the legislature.

Mr. Chandler discussed in detail some of the planks in the platform upon which the delegation is making the race. Some of the more salient points in which the delegation is especially interested are the increased pay for teachers in the city schools, increased salaries and pension funds for firemen and policemen and a more equitable distribution of the tax monies paid into the hands of the state highway department.

The delegation pledges itself to seek the passage of a law which will return to Shelby county the large disbursements from the state based on the amount of automobile taxes paid in by the county.

The delegation also proposes to push for passage of a law that will remedy the conditions which brought about the recent strike of firemen in the city.

That farmers everywhere exert themselves to stem out night riding, that the government revise the suspended fine for the offense of opening the cotton markets of Central Europe.

That the federal reserve board make clear to banks the term "orderly marketing."

That cotton acreage for 1921 be reduced 50 per cent, and if farmers in the meantime fail to obtain a profitable price, then that no cotton at all be planted next year.

That no cotton be sold under any contract for less than cost of production.

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HOLDING EFFORTS BOOST TO WHEAT

CHICAGO, Oct. 16.—Organized efforts of farmers to withhold grain and to agitate for higher prices have gone hand in hand this week with a big ascent in values compared with a week ago, wheat this morning was up 2 1/2 cents, corn had gained 3/4 cent and oats 1/2 cent.

There were reports of a further increase in wheat prices, indicating that the producers were holding out for a higher price. The wheat market had been depressed and that there was urgent need from Canada.

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EMMY DESTIN, GIFTED SOPRANO, LIKENS IT TO PRAGUE, HER NATIVE CITY—FOND OF HOUSEKEEPING AND FISHING—ADVICE TO ASPIRANTS.

"It is so like my own dear Prague," declared the madame enthusiastically. "There is the same joie de vivre, the same freedom of movement in walking among the women with the same splendid poise of the head. Then, too, there is the same delightful courtesy of a people who really take time to live. Memphis will be enraptured in my heart with my own beautiful Bohemian city."

"I studied in Prague under the brilliant teacher, Mme. Lowe-Destiny, a marvelous disciplinarian and one who was capable of compelling you to live up to your very best. I shall never forget the wonderful studio which she had in her home, a young and gifted woman that, with her permission, I took her name, my own being Kittel Often Exhausted."

"But it was not all cake and claret. There were hours of exhausting labor, and it would seem that victory was not worth the tremendous sacrifice involved. If American girls think that a musical career means all glory, applause and a good time, let them abuse themselves of the idea at once. Often I have practiced until I was literally exhausted mentally and physically, only to have the dear old madame say, 'There, my dear, you have done nothing! Nothing! How ever it made victory all the sweeter when it did come.'

"After I was so successful in my own beloved Prague I spent ten years as a member of the Royal opera house in Berlin. This was the Kaiser's favorite house and I had a number of occasions he had descended to lead the orchestra himself, besides being a Heavenly-born ruler by divine right. He fancied himself a great musician. He staged his production, 'Sardanapalus,' there, and was one of the most wonderful productions I have ever seen. He was so pleased that he presented me with a diamond breastpin which I promptly bestowed upon a charitable institution in my native land. For his birthday I presented him with a diamond bracelet. I hated the Kaiser and all his cohorts.

"During the war I was imprisoned in the Hun hordes in my native city of Prague. I can not begin to enumerate the indignities I had to suffer. Our Austrian masters seemed to take an especially bitter delight in making matters as unpleasant for me as possible. One huge Austrian officer, with fierce mustaches, varied the program by trying to make me make love to me. I could not tell which was the worse, his love-making or the brutality of the other officers.

"The one thing I am proudest of, besides my mother's love, is my American citizenship. Ah, you Americans do not know what a wonderful wonderful country we have. It takes one to try to live abroad and realize what a paradise America is. I always leave this dear land with keenest regret, and return to it with a joy that never fails.

"One's career as an artist often interferes with one's inclinations. I dearly love housekeeping. I do nothing better than preparing a meal for my friends, and I love to sweep and sew. It is like heaven to me when I can have friends drop in for a meal, and roll my sleeves up to my elbows and cook something for them that they would like. I can not be beat—I don't think—in the preparation of pilaf and real Hungarian goulash, not the spurious stuff that you meet with so often. I have also become very fond of making omelets, oyster pie and fruit cake, and I can make them to the president's taste, as one should say, now that we are Americans. Besides housekeeping, my favorite pastime is fishing. I never tire of it, and when I heard what splendid fishing was being had around Memphis, I brought my rods with me. I am a member of the famous Tuna club of Santa Catalina, where you have the privilege of game fish in the world before you are eligible for membership.

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PRINT PAMPHLETS FOR MASSACHUSETTS VOTERS

BOSTON, Mass., Oct. 16.—(By International News Service.)—One million copies will be printed and distributed of the official state pamphlet which will give information to the voters of the referendum to appear on the state ballot Nov. 2. Secretary of State Langtry announced. The pamphlet results from that provision of the initiative and referendum that the people shall have ample knowledge of all acts which are submitted to them for their approval or rejection. The 2 1/2 per cent beer and wine bill will appear on the ballot throughout the state. In Malden, Medford and Swampscott the voters will accept or reject the two-platoon bill for firemen.

BOSTON, Mass., Oct. 12.—(By International News Service.)—There will be no cutting of trans-Atlantic steamship fares for saloon or cabin accommodations according to officials of the White Star line and Cunard companies. There has been a big slump in ocean travel during the past few weeks and it was expected that the big British passenger lines were contemplating more attractive rates to fill up their ships.

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
