## Weddings

### Sutton-Gillespy.

A wedding of widespread interest will be solemnized at Hotel Gayoso on Thursday evening, when Miss Jeanne Marie Sutton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Stanley Sutton, will be married to Dr. John Sharp Gillespy, of Birmingham, Alabama. The handsomely decorated new drawing room of the hotel will be the scene of the wedding, and will be elaborately decorated for the occasion with a wealth of greenery, bringing into relief great sheafs of giant white chrysanthemums and exquisite white France roses, while the beautiful effect will be heightened by white tapers gleaming in tall white cathedral holders. Tall white floor vases, holding white chrysanthemums and linked by festoons of smilax, will form the aisle leading to the improvised altar, which will be banked with palms and white chrysanthemums, with showers of roses.

The nuptial music will be rendered by an orchestra and preceding the ceremony Mr. Owen Gillespy, brother of the bridegroom, will sing "I Love You Truly" and "At Dawning," with harp, cello and violin accompaniment. The Wagnerian bridal chorus from "Lohengrin" will be rendered as the processional.

The ceremony will be impressively solemnized at 8:30 o'clock, the Rev. C. T. Wright, pastor of the church, officiating in the presence of a limited number of friends and relatives.

For the ceremony the bride will wear an exquisite robe of white tulle and velvet, having panels edged in pearls over silver brocade, with a court train of real lace, over which her veil will fall from a coronet of valley lilies. She will carry a chateaufort bouquet of valley lilies and gardenias.

The maid of honor, Miss Zena Tutwiler, will be beautifully gowned in orchid and rose two-toned taffeta, in bouffant effect, and will carry an arm bouquet of chrysanthemums in pastel tints.

The flower girl, little Miss Nell Lippett, will wear a dainty frock of flesh satin in panner effect, with a quaint bodice and will carry a gold basket filled with rose petals to scatter in the pathway of the bride.

Dr. Gillespy will have as his best man, his brother Mr. James Gillespy, of Birmingham, and Mr. Ernest Stanley Sutton, Jr., as groomsmen.

The ceremony will be followed by a wedding reception, when the guests will be cordially welcomed by Mrs. and Mrs. Sutton, the latter being gowned in black silk Brussels net, embroidered in sequins, with a corsage bouquet of roses and valley lilies.

A delicious wedding menu will be served to the guests who will have the pleasure of viewing the beautiful

array of wedding gifts. The bride's table will be draped in handsome lace over pink satin. In the center will be the three-tiered wedding cake, around which will be a low, white lattice work, in which bride's tulle will be caught in bows holding sprays of valley lilies, the end of the tulle extending to the edge of the table, where it will be caught in large bows, with clusters of valley lilies. White tapers, burning in silver candlesticks, their light softened by white silken shades, will alternate with silver compotes holding salted nuts and bonbons.

At a late hour Dr. Gillespy and his bride will leave for a short bridal trip, returning to Birmingham, Alabama, on Friday morning. The lovely young bride will be complimented with a series of brilliant social affairs.

For traveling, the bride will wear a handsome redingote model of mid-night blue tulle, laced up the front and with laced sleeves, with a sealskin coat and a Vogue hat of French gray and blue tulle.

Among the guests from a distance present at the wedding will be Mr. and Mrs. Clarence J. Palmer, of Birmingham, uncle and aunt of the bride; Mrs. Felton Wimberly, sister, and Messrs. James and Owen Gillespy, brothers of the bridegroom, all of Birmingham.
