

Headline Bantams Clash in Eight-Round Bout at Local Glove Shop — Memphian Will Be Favorite.

Pal Moore, legitimate king of the bantams, a native Memphian, will be seen in action Monday night at the Southern Athletic club in an eight-round bout against Bobby Hughes, of Fort Worth, Tex. Moore arrived Saturday and added the finishing touches in a brief workout Sunday. Hughes has been in Memphis all the week, remaining here following his knockout of Kid Pancho, of California, last Monday night, at the local glove emporium. Billy Haack will pick the winner at the end of the eight rounds.

Moore will be the favorite when the two midgets enter the ring owing to the class he shows every time he dons the mitts. Pal stands head and shoulders above every bantam in the ring, and he has been crowned as a glovester he has beaten every headliner that the midget flock has to offer. He has taken the measure of Pete Hernandez, the titleholder on many occasions, but has never been able to get Pete in the ring for a title match. He met Kid Williams when that worthy was champion, and knocked him down twice in an eight-round no-decision bout. That was the closest Pal ever came to winning the bantam crown.
