THE EAST.

The National Board of Underwriters Condemns the Chicago Fire Department.

Samuel Wilkinson Says That Tilton is the Champion Liar of America.

NEW YORK, July 28. The report of the committee appointed by the National Board of Fire of the Underwriters to investigate the condition of the Chicago fire department was to be given to the press. It concerns severely the present management and operation of the department, which is almost entirely in the hands of politicians, and is supervised solely by one, namely, the Chief Marshal, who, being under party influence, is powerless. The men are demoralized and know no discipline. The committee recommended the entire reorganization of the fire department, with a board of commissioners like that of New York.

BROOKLYN, July 28. No further developments have been made in the business before the committee, further than that the committee have decided to call Mr. Moulton as the next witness, asking him in their invitation to produce all documents in his possession that relate in any way to the case.

Moulton was called to Narragansett yesterday, to the bedside of his dying wife. He is looked for in Brooklyn to-day, and as the committee meet again this evening, his acceptance of the invitation will be made known.

Tilton does not expect Moulton to testify before the committee as now formed, and if Moulton does not answer the call to testify, Mr. Beecher's testimony will be taken without further delay.

The committee are growing weary with much work and late hours, and wish for the end. Mrs. Tilton read the published interview with Stanton, this evening, and threw up her hands in despair at the friends with whom she was staying, "How false it is!" She began to read the cross-examination of Mr. Tilton, as presented yesterday, and remarked to some persons there that she was no more afraid of anything he can say or write. She is cheerful, and is looking forward hopefully to the completion of the testimony of Mr. Samuel Wilkinson secretary of the Northern R. R. Co., before the investigating committee.

Tilton first went to him with several sheets of letters bearing the seals of which he threatened to publish unless Mr. Beecher did justice to his character. He was dismissed from the editorship of the Independent and Union and said in his waning fortunes Mr. Beecher had been indifferent to him. In publishing the cross-examination, Mr. Tilton says that he did not say that Mr. Beecher had not been friendly to him, and Mr. Wilkinson does not say under oath.

Mr. Tilton said in this conversation to-day, Mr. Wilkinson replied as follows:

I reaffirm every word of the published testimony. It is true every word of it, and will testify to it under oath in a court of justice. When Tilton denies my statement of his conversation with me he lies. Indeed he is the champion liar of America. No man since the days of Baron Munchausen has lied as he lies to-day. In conversation with a friend this evening it was remarked to Mr. Tilton that the indefinite answers he had given to General Tracy in the published reports of his cross-examination respecting dates were commented upon somewhat unfavorably, as tending to weaken the force of his statement. To this he replied that he never had a memory for dates. If he was asked in a court of justice the ages of his children he did not think he could answer them. The only dates he could remember were the 4th of July and the 22d of February. Although he had tried scores of times to remember the date, he repeat the Lord's prayer correctly.

DETROIT, July 27.

The Daily Union of this city has been merged into the Evening News.

SARATOGA, July 28. There was a large attendance at the races to-day. The weather was splendid. In the first race, for the Alabama stakes, mile and one-eighth, seven starters, was won by Reynolds. Countess second, Madge third. Time, 2:00. The second race for a five hundred dollar purse; three-quarters of a mile, was won by Katie Pease; Minnie Macke second, Dublin third. Time, 1:17.

PITTSBURG, July 28. The work of removing the debris at Butcher's Run is progressing rapidly. Some 200 men are at work in the mud and earth accumulated in vast heaps. Houses deeply imbedded are being torn to pieces to get out the bodies of the dead. A heavy rain hangs over the ruins, and field odors arise. No bodies have been recovered to-day.

Over forty dead horses have been taken out. City Engineer Dempster says it will take \$100,000 to regrade the streets of Pittsburg alone. The Relief Committee are raising money in this city for the sufferers.

CABLEGRAMS.

Death of the Austrian Rothschild.

A War Between China and Russia Almost Inevitable.

A Prussian Bishop Condemned to Fifteen Months Imprisonment.

VIENNA, July 28. Anselm Rothschild, of this city, died to-day.

HAVANA, July 28. A dispatch from Las Tunas reports that Spanish forces reconnoitering in that vicinity, have exchanged shots with the insurgents at various times. The latter have attacked the villages of Calderon and Unas, though with what result is not known.

DUBLIN, July 28. John Mitchell has arrived at Cork. He is ill but will come to Dublin on Wednesday. The Fenian Amnesty Association are organizing a torch light demonstration and banquet in his honor. Mr. Martin a member of parliament from Meath, will resign his seat in favor of Mr. Mitchell.

BRUSSELS, July 28. It is stated that Russia only desires congress assembled here to consider certain points of its programme. She does not insist upon the adoption of the whole of the programme of the Belgian and minister of foreign affairs, has been appointed secretary of congress.

LONDON, July 28. A special dispatch to the Daily News reports great destruction of property by floods in Moravia, and at least two hundred houses have been swept away.

The Times' dispatches from India say the prospect of crops is most favorable, notwithstanding the recent heavy rains.

Many deaths from cholera are reported in Burdwan.

MADRID, July 28. Forty-one Carlists, most of them ecclesiastics or members of the nobility, have been arrested at Barcelona, by way of a re-approval against the inhuman conduct of the Carlists.

There is a report current that the Carlists have again been beaten by the Republican forces, and have sustained very heavy losses. Two companies of Carlists, who refused to surrender, were cut to pieces.

LONDON, July 28. The committee of the Agricultural Laborers' Union have adopted a resolution declaring that "as we are not justified in appealing to the public for support for the locked-out laborers in the eastern counties during harvest, therefore we offer them the alternative of immigration, or depending on their own resources." The committee are negotiating for easier terms of immigration to Canada.

Gaskell Bros., cotton merchants in Liverpool, have failed. Their liabilities are estimated at \$250,000.

BERLIN, July 28. Dr. Janikewski, the suffragan bishop of Posen, has been arrested for the violation of ecclesiastical laws and condemned to fifteen months imprisonment.

Dispatches from Kisenpong announce that the health of Prince Bismarck is improving, but that his wound is yet unhealed, and the Prince cannot write.

The journals here say that war between Russia and China is inevitable in consequence of designs by the latter upon Kashgar.

PARIS, July 28. At the session of the Assembly on Monday the benches of the Left were well filled, most of the absent members having returned. The Committee on Parliamentary Limitation made a report on the resolutions for a dissolution, recommending that the Assembly proceed to constitute a government, or dissolve. After intense excitement, the debate was adjourned until Wednesday. It is thought that the consideration of the budget will occupy the Assembly until August 10th, about which time the House will adjourn until November 10th. The interval will be shorter than was expected, because the Conservatives fear that a long recess will incline the Left Centre to support the dissolution. Parties in favor of the dissolution are confident of success after recess, and believe their opponents will have a majority on Wednesday, when the resolutions come to a vote.
