FOREIGN EVENTS.

The Boers Proclaim Themselves Conquerors of the Transvaal.

Excitement Over the Seizure of the American Ordnance Ship "Juno," in Ireland.

John Bright Receives a Deplimentary Letter From the Earl Carnarvon.

JOHN BRIGHT DENOUNCED.

LONDON, December 24, 1 a. m.—The Right Honorable Earl of Carnarvon, who is nowjourning at Madeira, has written a letter to John Bright, indignantly denouncing Mr. Bright's speech delivered at Birmingham, on the 13th November, and protesting against Mr. Bright retaining his office.

FLOODS IN ENGLAND.

LONDON, December 23-10 p. m.—A small stream is reported around Manchester. The river, however, a small stream which furnishes water power to Manchester and several other manufacturing towns in Lancashire, has overflowed its banks, and done great damage to the mills. Communication with the suburbs of Manchester is cut off, and in the vicinity of the city a number of cattle have been drowned. The waters continue rising, and further and more serious trouble is apprehended.

IRELAND'S ALLIES.

DUBLIN, November 12-1 a. m.—It was discovered last night that three wagon loads of arms had been removed from the "Juno" before the discovery by the authorities. Custom house officers have possession of the ship, and have summoned a battery of artillery and a force of marines to accompany the "Juno" to the mouth of the river. The affair creates intense excitement, and had the mission of the vessel been generally known, it would have resulted in a general insurrection of the people.

THE BOERS' REBELLION.

LONDON, December 23-10 p. m.—Mr. D. Donnelly, acting as the colonial office, received a telegram from Durban, South Africa, dated to-day, stating that an action is reported to have taken place at Middleburg, between the Boers and the colonial soldiers, in which two hundred of the latter were killed, and fifty taken prisoners. The details are not given, but the preliminary reports are that the battle referred to occurred since the action at Halketstrom, on the 15th. Little is known of the fighting, but it is understood that the troubles in the Transvaal are increasing, and may necessitate military interference by the general government.

CINCINNATI, O., December 23-10 p. m.—A special from Elizabeth, Ky., says that the magistrate's court near there, two litigants, Carter and Harrington, became involved in a difficult fight when Harrington drew a pistol and shot Carter in the mouth, the ball coming at the back of his neck. He fell on the floor apparently in a lifeless condition, with the blood running out of his ears and mouth. Carter's son then shot Harrington down, and Carter raised from his pool of blood, and Harrington's head into a jelly with a single blow, and sank back in his bloody bed. When our informant left the blood-curdling scene, Harrington was dead, and by his side lay a note written in his own blood. It was thought impossible for him to live.

Flouring Mills Burned.

St. Louis, December 24-1 a. m.—The Pacific flouring mill caught fire at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, and was totally destroyed. A workman was caught in the fourth floor, and had to jump. He was instantly killed. Fireman Carroll, of steamer No. 13, was also killed, and several men were hurt. There is no more fire in the city, and it is thought that no fire will be kindled.
