ACCIDENTAL FRAUDS.

Fatal Shooting in the Outskirts of the City.

At a late hour last evening Coroner Jacobs was notified of a tragedy which occurred early Wednesday morning in the outskirts of the city.

Jacob Shipporet, a farmer who lives on the Cornetts farm, just below town, came into the city and informed him of the facts, which were substantially as follows:

For some time past Mr. Shipporet has been annoyed considerably by tramps, and procured a revolver, which he kept under his pillow.

Wednesday morning he got up quite early and started to town, leaving his father's pillow, began examining it and while he was doing so his brother came up. In some way the revolver was accidentally discharged and the younger boy was struck by the ball, which penetrated his abdomen.

Dr. Grossman was summoned and did all that was possible for the unfortunate boy, but he expired at 1 p. m. yesterday.

Coroner Jacobs did not, last night, deem it necessary to hold an inquest as the facts in the case were plain.

Mr. S. feels terribly over the matter, and takes all the blame for the fatal accident upon himself.

An application for premium for base ball was referred to Mr. Gronell to report at next meeting.

Secretary Wheeler was instructed to draw a warrant for the amount due Omaha driving park last year's applicants.

On motion the president was instructed to communicate with the Omaha board of trade in reference to erection of a dining hall on the fair grounds.

The contract for furnishing scores for races during fair week, was let to W. M. Flynn, of The Turf, Field and Farm, of New York city.

An application for check book was referred to President McIntyre.

A proposition from the Electric Ice company of Omaha to light the grounds during the fair until 12 o'clock at night, was laid over for consideration.

M. Dunham was instructed to negotiate a proposition for furnishing power to run Power hall.

Secretary Wheeler was instructed to draw fifty silver medals for the coming fair.
