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CROOK'S RETURN.

General Crook returns to us on a flying visit after nearly ten months absence from this city and the military department of which he was so long the honored head.

The general's stay in Omaha is limited to the space between two days. He is hurrying on to Washington to explain his Indian policy to Secretaries Lincoln and Teller, both of whom seem greatly in need of enlightenment.

General Crook's many friends in this department have watched with gratification his operations in the department of Arizona during the past ten months. They have seen the same shrewdness, sagacity and practical common sense that marked his campaigns and conferences with the Sioux.

The general goes to Washington backed by the petitions of all Arizona and the earnest recommendation of General Schofield that he may be allowed to settle in his own way the Indian question in the South-west.

KANSAS CITY is having trouble with the paving question under circumstances quite dissimilar from those in Omaha. A majority of the property-owners on Delaware street petitioned for stone pavements, and a strong effort was made to ring in Colorado sandstone.

THE new fast-fitting schedule of the Union Pacific road went into effect yesterday, shortening the time to San Francisco by twenty-four hours and bringing Nebraska towns from four to six hours nearer to Omaha.
