CECIL RAPIDS' MURDER. The Mystery of the Tragedy on the Bridge--The Victim's Body Found--He Proves to be an ex-Convict.

Cedar Rapids Republican, March 21. At 8 o'clock last night occurred a single tap of the fire bell--the signal calling all police to headquarters. A man had been killed on the C. M. & St. P. railway bridge--a spot uncovered by the police, and although the imploring cries of the victim were heard by at least half a dozen persons, and although the murderer passed within a foot of two men directly after the commission of the crime, he was still at large and the full energies of the force were needed. Information in regard to the tragedy was first received at the police station when Mr. Beck, the tailor, who lives in the vicinity, on First street, rushed in and stated that he knew there was something wrong on the bridge--that he had

HEARD CHIEFS OF MURDER, HELP, ETC. Marshal Francis at once ordered the covering of all points out of the city, and sent an officer to the scene of the murder. At the west end of the bridge about 500 feet of trestle work extends from the last pier almost to First street. On the trestle work, with the aid of lanterns, blood was found on the track and ties. Underneath on the ground was a great pool of blood, as though a man had been stabbed and held down in one position for a length of time. Near where the blood was discovered John Garratt picked up a silver quarter and a button. A small piece of red cloth found near proved to be a piece of a necktie, apparently cut from a scarf at a single stroke from a

KNIFE OR RAZOR. From this point a trail of blood, now out of the track and then on the ties, led the searchers about 100 feet to the north side of the bridge and then a short distance farther to the south side. Here another pool was found, as though having flown from a wounded man lying in one position. Here were also found two silver half dollar pieces, a portion of the handle of a razor, freshly broken, and a small and very peculiar bone knife or tooth-pick, all more or less bespattered with blood. The searching party received additions almost every minute, and there were at least 500 people on the bridge at one time. A number of persons declared they had heard cries of murder, but this testimony was not necessary to convince those who saw the evidence on the bridge. As we stated above, the murderer passed within a foot of two men and escaped. These men were Geo. Lamb, of 600 First street west, and Wm. Henderson, of 219 Second street west. They were

SO EASILY SCARED that for a time they were scarcely able to tell what they had seen and heard. At 12 o'clock last night a reporter called at Mr. Lamb's residence and found him in bed--but not asleep. He had not slept any, and didn't expect to for a day or two. He arose, lighted a lantern and accompanied the reporter to the scene of the murder, and on the way related his story. He said:

"I was chopping wood in front of my house about 7 o'clock, when I heard some one on the bridge cry murder. About this time Mr. Henderson came along, and we stood and listened. We heard sounds as though some one was being clubbed. Then we heard a man, or I think a boy, begging pitiously. I never heard any one beg as he did. He cried,

"FOR GOD'S SAKE, DON'T KILL ME!" "Save me, for God's sake!" and I don't know what all he did say. By and by we heard a feeble cry, and then heard the water splash. We walked down the track on the trestle work, and had gone but a short distance on the bridge when about eighteen feet ahead of us we saw a big man. He seemed undetermined which way to go, but started west and passed us. He was a very big man--I think he must have been nearly seven feet tall, and as there was no light he was soon out of sight. I have no doubt that he killed the person and then threw him over the bridge, and think it was a boy who was killed; think it was a boy's voice we heard."

Mr. Lamb, when asked why the man was not halted, admitted that he and Henderson were afraid they would be pushed off the bridge.

THE VICTIM'S BODY. CEDAR RAPIDS, Ia., March 21.--The body of the man murdered last night on the bridge was found this morning on a cake of ice. He was identified as an ex-convict named Joseph Chum, discharged from the Anamosa penitentiary Tuesday last. He is from Sioux county. He had no money to spend, and the most plausible theory is that he was murdered by a companion.
