MINOR MENTION.

See J. Reiter's new fall stock of cloth. The democrats hold their primaries this evening. The front of the opera house is to be lighted by the electric light. Draper's Uncle Tom's Cabin company arrived at the Pacific yesterday. Col. Jesse Harper will speak at the court house to-morrow evening. The democratic county convention is to meet here next Wednesday. Gauze underwear at cost to close out stock, J. J. Auwerda & Co., 317 Broadway. The mayor has personally notified the saloons not to sell to certain well known citizens. Leave to marry has been given D. T. VanChief and Mrs. Mary Drum, both of Harrison. H. S. Shoemaker's name is one of the probable democratic nominees for justice of the peace. A bridge over Indian creek above the brickyard was washed away by Friday's night rain. Cyclone cigarettes for sale at Opera house cigar store, only ten cents for a package of twenty. Judge Aylesworth on Saturday sentenced three vagrants to ten days' work on the streets. Some of the saloons were open yesterday. Has the mayor revoked Chief Skinner's order to close up on Sundays? The picked nine beat the D. and D. Institute second nine in a game of baseball on Saturday afternoon, 16 to 12 in five innings. William Sears, esq., of this city was booked for a speech at the republican mass meeting at Wahoo, Nebraska, Saturday night. The ladies of the woman's exchange are very busy getting arrangements perfected for the grand opening of their exposition at the skating rink this evening. The greenback congressional convention is to meet here to-morrow. It is arranged that the convention will either make no nomination, or else endorse Mr. Pusey. Mrs. Harry Jones who was thrown by a slip of the saddle, while horse back riding, is recovering rapidly from her injuries which are not so serious as at first thought. Messrs. Ritchie Bros., who have been in the lumber business, corner Eleventh avenue and Third street, are closing out and continue only their Plattsmouth, Neb., business. The city council is to meet to-night to pass an ordinance authorizing the issuance of bonds for the improvement of Indian creek. To-morrow afternoon the council is to meet again to receive bids. The first ward democratic primary is to be held to-night at Weis & Clausen's store; the second ward at the city council chamber; the Third ward at Justice Schurz's office; the Fourth at the court house. Ed Goodwin, while with his father, stopping at an Omaha hotel Saturday night, was relieved of a gold watch and \$3 in money, some sneak thief taking advantage of the door being left unlocked. The Mills county greenback convention met at Malvern Saturday, and endorsed the nominees of the democratic county convention, the supervisor and recorder being democrats, and the clerk a greenbacker. "Yong Kipper," the Jewish feast of the atonement began last evening at 6 o'clock, and continues until 6 o'clock this evening. Services were held in the Royal Arcanum hall last evening and will be kept up to-day. It is said that the coming democratic nominees for justices will be N. Schurz, A. S. Hendricks and J. J. Frayne. Mr. Schurz has made so excellent a record that many republicans will be glad to see him continue in office. George Edgar has returned from Bradysville, Iowa, where he took William Gottbrecht who was arrested for obtaining goods of Groneweg & Schoentgen under false pretense. Gottbrecht got the required bonds of \$1,500. The heavy rain of Friday night gave the street improvements on Broadway a pretty thorough test. The paving in places settled some, especially where sewers had lately been placed the dirt not being packed so solidly as elsewhere. J. A. Bede has withdrawn from the Tabor Union, and the management of the paper has fallen into the hands of Joe La Chappelle and C. C. Calwell. Bede says "Our reasons for withdrawing are generally known and need not be repeated here." M. V. Gannon, the democratic attorney general, in a letter to Mayor Vaughan, says he will soon be here to make a speech, and it is probable that it can be arranged for him to be here at the same time as that set for Hor. J. G. Carlisle. A laborer on C. B. & Q. claims to have been held up and robbed of several dollars Friday night while walking along

the street car track, between Broadway and the transfer. He says two men held him while two others in front went through him. County Clerk Street is very anxious to have all those concerned reminded that the law requires the reporting of all marriages, deaths and births. Ministers, doctors, justices, etc., should not wait for a second or sharp reminder. It is desired to have all reports in by October 1st at which time the clerk is expected to make up the books. The papers of the city have got mixed badly on the announcements of the speech of Col. Jesse Harper. The fact is that the colonel will speak here to-morrow evening at the court house, or if the weather is favorable, he will speak in the park. It is understood that he will devote most of the evening to a discussion of labor questions. Charles McKenzie, of Dunlap, who is said to be a pretty good man when whisky is out and he is in, was yesterday morning so full that he was making a hearty show of himself in front of the ladies' room at the transfer. He was arrested and brought before Justice Schurz who fined him \$5 and costs. Frank Hunter who was appointed temporarily to the office of clerk of the United States courts here, to fill the vacancy caused by Marshall Key's death seems to be giving satisfaction, and will probably be continued to that position. Other names were mentioned however, as liable to be given the place, among them J. J. Stewart and F. H. Odell. On Saturday afternoon there was a happy little wedding party at the residence of Mrs. MacKenzie on Scott street, the bride being her daughter, Miss Mary E. MacKenzie, and the groom being Mr. O. K. Pratt, an employe of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway company. The ceremony was performed by Rev. T. J. Mackay, in the presence of a small gathering of the relatives and intimate friends. The newly-wedded pair started for Chicago on a brief trip. Capt. John Swobe, who has command of the ferry cars of the dummy train, found yesterday in one of the cars, an old horse, without any one apparently in charge of it. On reaching this side, the horse was let out of the cars, and soon fell down on the street, apparently overcome with old age and fasting. The chief of police notified Swobe that he must put the horse in a stable or otherwise provide for it at the expense of the Union Pacific. It seems that some one put up this job on Swobe in order to get rid of the horse, which had outlived its usefulness. Roadmaster Gray, of the "Q," came near meeting his fate Wednesday morning last. While riding on top of a freight train going west from Malvern to Hillsdale, talking with the conductor at the time, he was struck on the back of the head by a brace on the Howe bridge and knocked down which such force as to render him insensible for some time. Had it not been for the conductor, Gray would have fallen under the train, which would have been certain death. Mr. Gray has been on the road over twenty years and this he says is the first accident of a serious character. The conductor says that when he came to, his first remark was "Gosh!
