MINOR MENTION.

The young folks of the presbyterian church are to have a picnic Thursday afternoon.

The regular weekly entertainment of the young men's christian association will be omitted this week.

It isn't much of a night now that can't have at least one storm. June is having a good deal to blow about.

Out Wing, who was arrested for carrying a Mexican gun, is to have a hearing before Judge Aylesworth to-day.

Ed and Frank Miller, two sons of "Sport," have been taken in charge of by the police, and will probably be sent to the reform school, they having the reputation of being hard boys.

The district court was not in session yesterday. This morning the trial of criminal cases will commence, the cases of Connor and Wilson for burglarizing Cooper & McGee's store being the first to be tried.

Nick Cleary, well known among the railway men, and living in Streetville, is reported as having been missing for over a week. It is supposed that his mind has got a little out of balance, and that he has thus wandered off.

Dennis Downey was arrested at the instance of Detective Faro, of the St. Paul road, on the charge of exposing his person. It appearing that it was more carelessness than any evil intent, the judge dismissed him with a caution to be more discreet.

The platform for the dancing at the lawn party to be given by the episcopal-lan ladies next Thursday evening, was being built yesterday on Judge James' lawn and other arrangements are going forward well, with every prospect of the affair being one of the happiest and most successful of any yet given by the society.

The opening of a medical and surgical institute here by Dr. Palmer, with several other physicians associated with him, is now an assured fact, the lease having yesterday been made of the rooms over DeVol's hardware store, No. 504 Broadway, and they will be fitted up at once and the business opened with the determination of making it a permanent one.

The residents in the vicinity of Broadway and Ninth street were aroused Saturday night by the cries of a man who seemed to be having a street difficulty with some one. It seemed that there were some women mixed up in the attack on the man, and that after he had been knocked down he was picked up and carried off, and nothing more has been learned as to how badly he was injured, or what was the occasion of the outbreak.

"Sport" Miller was nominally fined yesterday, but no attempt will be made to collect it. The fellow who sold him the stuff should be found out and made to pay it, for all here know his weakness, and that he is a mere wreck of a man, and cannot control himself. The spectacle which he made of himself on the streets on Sunday was a most indecent one, and there should be some way of reaching the really guilty party.

The business men are to meet in the masonic hall to-morrow evening to decide whether they will submit to being taxed a license on their various enterprises. It was expected that the action of the council would cause an indignation meeting to be called by the citizens themselves, but in this the council missed their guess, and the council has called the meeting themselves. There should be a full turn out, and a free for all discussion of the various problems now puzzling the brains of the aldermanic fathers.

This morning at 10:30 in the baptist church the council called for the recognition of the lately organized church will meet for business. This council will consist of delegates from twenty or more churches of Nebraska and Iowa. In the afternoon the recognition services of the church will take place. In the evening the recognition of the pastor will take place. The Rev. Mr. Watson will preach in the afternoon and Dr. Hulbert, of Chicago, in the evening. Various other parts will be taken by different ministers in attendance. These services will be of great interest. All are invited.

FIGHTING SUSPICIONS.

Young Mason Shows Up His Innocence of the Tin Tapping Charge.

The case of George Mason, the young man who was suspected of having taken money from the office of Mr. J. G. McIntyre's coffee and spice house, has attracted a good deal of attention. The father of the young man, Judge Mason, of New York, on hearing of the affair came here and has been investigating all the details for several days, and endeavoring to have the matter set right. He has succeeded in convincing nearly all who have had any knowledge of the facts that there is no charge which can justly be laid to the door of his son in connection with the losing of the money. The facts as they first appeared on the surface naturally pointed to young Mason as having been the offender. It was stated that after he had been discharged by McIntyre he had been seen in the vicinity of the store about the time that the money was taken, and that there were but two or three persons who knew where the money was, and he was one of them. It was claimed that he was seen in company with another young man in the vicinity of the rear of the store, about the time of the robbery, and was noticed by a servant girl in the employ of some neighboring house. It was also claimed that before the taking of the money young Mason had no money, and that right away afterwards he had \$17. Soon after the occurrence he was said to have left the city, and that his whereabouts were not known.

The investigation of the facts indicates that the young man has been at least a victim of unfortunate circumstances. It appears that instead of being out of money, as was supposed, he had been paid money by his employer, and had not spent it, which accounted for the money he had with him. It was also shown by the affidavits of reputable citizens that his whereabouts were so accounted for during the time covering the taking of the money, as well as the time immediately preceding and following, so as to make a complete alibi. It also appeared that all the servant girl knew about the matter was that she saw two men in the vicinity of the rear of the store, one of whom was dressed similar to the way that young Mason was, and carrying an umbrella, he having had one with him that night. She could not identify either of the men, and could not tell whether they entered the store. The absence of the young man from the city has been accounted for on the showing that he went on legitimate business, and that he made known his intention of doing so on that day to his employer and others several days previous, and that there was no skipping out or attempt to get away from the charge, but on the contrary as soon as it was made public he presented an appearance, and began the task of clearing up all suspicions.

The affair has been an unfortunate one, and has caused some bad feeling on the part of some concerned. The case has not reached the courts, and probably never will, and the attempt of the father and son to clear up the suspicions aroused by the statements made has been a difficult one in some respects, and by no means an agreeable one to those concerned. It has proved quite successful and the public have learned enough now to be satisfied to have the affair drop into oblivion, and give room for some fresh sensation. There has been a rigid search for some proof of the young man's guilt, but none has been found, and the showing which is made in support of his innocence has been sufficiently strong to do away with the suspicions aroused by the fact as they first appeared.


