A fishing party, consisting of John, George and Robert Oliver, Edward Martin, Victory Bayard, William Rodgers and other members of the athletic club, left yesterday for Honey creek.

J. R. Snyder, who has embarked in the fruit and commission business with Mr. Leaman, has sold his grocery store to J. P. Filbert, who for so long a time has been in that business here, and who recently sold out to his brother.

Mr. H. Friedman returned from Des Moines yesterday morning. He wishes to return thanks through THE BEE to the fire department for their efficient work at the fire in his store, No. 321 Broadway, on Sunday night last.

The city marshal was yesterday punishing up the common carriers, and trying to induce them to pay the license required under the new ordinance, which was passed in accordance with their own desire, but which they seem slow to comply with.

The democratic county convention, for the selection of thirteen delegates to the state convention, meets in this city this morning at 10 o'clock. The local squabble may break out afresh, or in some new spot, and make the gathering anything but a love-feast.

About twenty-four saloon men have paid the license, required under the ordinance. The delinquents are being called upon by the city officers, and urged to pay, but in view of the suits brought against them by private parties, they seem inclined to hold on to the money and use it for fighting the cases.

Yesterday afternoon some boys playing about the Indian creek ditch, in the vicinity of the Eight avenue bridge, discovered the body of an infant wrapped in a piece of cloth. The authorities were notified, and the coroner given possession of the little body, of whose history nothing could be learned. There were no marks of violence discernible, and the supposition is that the little one came to its death naturally, but was heartlessly disposed of.

The habeas corpus case in which Mr. Halney seeks to get possession of the three children, now in Mrs. Halney's keeping, still occupied the attention of Judge Aylesworth yesterday. The absence of some witnesses necessitated the continuance until this morning, Halney claiming that he will be able to show by these witnesses that Mrs. Halney was too intimate with Pete Hinckley, and was, in other respects, an unfit person to have the custody of the children.

Yesterday afternoon a company of about a dozen tramps were taken out of jail to work on the streets, under the superintendence of Dick Ricketts, who has so far recovered from his recent accident as to be able to be about, but with a limp. The fellows took advantage of this limp, and Ricketts' inability to run, and when in the vicinity of the Northwestern depot they all broke into a travel and escaped, leaving only one of their number to comfort the guard. Ricketts came back to the station and got three more and started out to work them, and at this rate he will soon have the town cleared of tramps, as the last seen of the fellows they were dashing for Sioux City.

The claims of the mayor of the city to having secured so many delegates from this city to the county convention is not only laughed at by the leaders of the opposing faction, but by some of those whom he names as being favorable to him. It matters little, however, to those who do not train in the democratic ranks, for there seems little chance for him to secure a majority of the delegates from the county, a still less chance for him to get any hold on the democratic nomination for governor, a still less chance for him to get elected if nominated. This whittles it down so fine that there is nothing in the future to get excited about.

Col. Keasley, whose name has been mentioned by the papers all over the state, in connection with the possible nomination for governor, by the democratic, and who has received many more favorable notices than some of those who have been writing up their own puff, and paying for them at double rates, has too much modesty to decline anything which has not been tendered him, but through his friends he makes public declaration that he cannot allow his name to be used in any such connection, for he

is not looking for any such honors, and is not waiting to be struck by lightning either. Lightning might find a worse rod, but he says he is no lightning rod at all.

ROUNDING 'EM UP.

The Police Instructed to Clean Up the City.

There have of late been a good many crooks, cappers, and tin horn gamblers gathering here and causing much trouble. Some of the gambling houses have themselves been boistered, and decent citizens have been sure'y so. This gang of fellows have got to the end of the rope now, and last evening the chief of police gave instructions to his men that if these loafers did not leave the city forthwith they should be arrested on sight. Chief Skinner says he has tired of publishing notices in the papers, and as these fellows know as well as he does that they have no business here, he proposes to have them arrested without any more talk. He yesterday secured from the keepers of gambling houses the names of those regularly employed in these places, and those who are found hanging about such places and whose names are not on the payroll, will be arrested as vagrants. Every few months this house cleaning becomes necessary, and the time seems to have come again. Chief Skinner has therefore given the order, and there will either be a lively emigration or some interesting cases will be opened in the police court.

BUSY BURGLARS.

They Spend the Night in Prowling About Main Street.

Some Plunder Secured by Them.

On the opening of business yesterday morning it was discovered that burglars had been the rounds during the night. One of the places visited was the crockery store of W. S. Homer & Co., No. 23 Main street. Entrance was gained by pulling off the rear shutters, and then the windows were easily raised. The fellows did not disturb the silverware, of which there was quite a large stock, but spent their energies and time by going through the desk, leaving the books and papers scattered about, and succeeding in finding in one of the drawers about \$75, which of course they took with them. Mr. Granly, whose drug store is next door, and who sleeps in the store, heard some peculiar noises about half past eleven o'clock, and a dog barking loudly, but did not think about burglars being about. Another place visited was the merchant tailoring establishment of Norene & Landstrom, No. 205 Main street. The entrance here was gained by the front door, which was apparently opened with a key, as there were no marks to be seen. When Mr. Landstrom came to the store about 8 o'clock yesterday morning he found the door a very little ajar, the spring having evidently brought the door nearly shut when the fellows went out. The whole place of cloth were undisturbed, but everything that was made up was taken, including five coats, one vest and three pairs of pantaloons, and a second-hand pair, left there for repairs. The total value of the clothing taken amounts to about \$120. There has been a man sleeping every night in the store, with a revolver in sheath, hanging right over his couch, but this man had gone to Avoas, and was expected back to-day. The revolver was hanging there in plain sight, but was not taken. Next to this tailoring establishment is a dressmaking shop, and some of the ladies there heard noises about 2 o'clock, a dog barking, and some one talking and walking in the tailor shop, and a noise as if there was scuffling, but supposing there was a man sleeping in the shop, they paid little attention to these sounds, except to go to the door, and try to quiet the dog.

IOWA ITEMS.

A new cattle disease is raging in Dubuque county.

Mr. Whipple of Waterloo was killed by lightning on Saturday.

A \$500 steam yacht, owned by J. J. Jackson, was launched at Des Moines, Friday.

The Iowa Democratic Newspaper association is called to meet at Cedar Rapids, Tuesday, Aug. 18.

Re Record in jail at Cedar Rapids, charged with outraging Addie Stoggs, aged fourteen years.

Prohibition prohibits in Humboldt county. The last two gentlemen who attempted violation of the law in that locality were fined \$600 each and costs.

Michael Devaney, one of the oldest residents of Allamakee county, fell from his wagon at Waukon Friday evening and broke his neck. The old gentleman was ninety-four years of age.

A locomotive and thirteen cars of a freight train were derailed and badly wrecked by a washout on the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railway, near French Colony station, on Thursday morning.

Two large double arches were erected in the capital city of Des Moines as part of the public decoration for Grant memorial day. The capitol building was also handsomely and elaborately draped.

The 5-year-old son of James Magill, while playing at the mill race near Cedar Rapids, Thursday evening, fell into the water and was drowned.

Mrs. Lincoln Baker, of Kansas City, arrived in Des Moines Wednesday night on a visit, and died in the hack while en route from the depot to her friend's home.

The county convention met at Davenport Saturday and elected thirteen delegates to the state convention to be held at Cedar Rapids, August 19. A resolution of condolence over Gen. Grant's death was adopted, as was one opposing fusion with the Greenback party in the state campaign.

Roswell L. Riley was killed in a row over a disputed land grant at Arlington, Woodbury county, Saturday. They row started between the Adkins and Seltzer squatters on the Sioux City & Pacific land grant. Riley took sides with the former, and was shot by one of the latter.

Mayor Rice, of Oskaloosa, employed a detective to locate and identify the gambling rooms and gamblers in that town, and made a descent with the police, capturing ten of the representative young men of the town, most of whom the righteous mayor fined \$100 each and costs.

The two-year-old child of Elmer Young, at Washington, fell into a stock well forty feet deep and seven feet across. The frantic but brave mother instantly went down to rescue it, she does not know how, and came up with it safe and well, but she has no idea how it was done. The child was uninjured.

Mr. McMahon, who lives three miles southeast of West Liberty, was 102 years old last Christmas. He came to Attala twenty years ago, and has never been further away from Muscatine since. The old gentleman asserts that he had never had a physician treat him, never wore glasses, hears and sees well, and can read coarse print with ease. Mr. McMahon is a No. 1 harvest hand, is now driving a reaper regularly, and is as anxious to push the work along as his son, who is 45 or 50 years of age.

The rain storm at Sioux City, Saturday morning, was the "biggest on record." The Journal says: "Old timers say that they never saw anything like the rain storm of yesterday morning. Very likely they never did. Beginning a little after 1 o'clock and lasting until nearly 4 a. m. the water was spilled out of a bottomless cask overhead. It did not rain in the usual sense of that word. It poured. During most of this time, noisily about 2 o'clock, the thunder and

lightning were simply terrible. A great many folks were up and around to curb the damage being done by the flood, or to await the destruction by lightning that seemed imminent. It was a wild, wet night.

Four masked men surprised, bound and blindfolded the watchman at Dr. Joyce's lumber office, Clinton. They spent three hours blowing the vault open with dynamite, but did not succeed in getting to the interior, and finally departed without booty. The watchman remained nearly an hour before help came. Another gang blew open the safe of Chamberlain & Stratton, grocers, at Camanche, and got a few dollars in change. Tuesday night six masked men intimidated the clerk at De Roy's double store at Fulton, Ill., and tried to open the safe, but were unsuccessful.
