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Home Industries.

Every hand held out to encourage home industries and home enterprise is a lever to advance the prosperity of the city and state. The most enterprising communities of the west are the most prosperous, and the most prosperous the most enterprising. The cities which have shown the greatest proportionate growth since the last census are those whose citizens have been quick to detect new and profitable investments for capital at home and eager to develop and to diversify industries which would employ home labor and consume home products.

Omaha has reached a point where the attention of her people needs to be directed to her urgent want of more industries to furnish employment for her rapidly increasing population. There are scores of enterprises which once planted would find root in this city and give profitable returns for the investment. Flouring mills, oat meal mills, canning factories, plow and agricultural implement works, and dozens of less pretentious industries, each of which would give employment for labor and investment for capital, could be maintained in Omaha. Manufacturers are what now give life and importance to cities. The artisans and operatives, the mechanics and specialists in various industries build up and maintain the commercial prominence of great municipalities as well as of the surrounding country. With the same density of population in Wisconsin and Alabama, the value of lands in the former averages \$23.70 per acre and in the latter \$1.19. The secret is found in the size of their industrial population, which is 20.7 and 4.7 per cent, respectively. Similar comparisons between other states give similar results.

Prof. J. R. Dodge, who collected these significant facts, says in commenting on them, "It is not merely population, but a harmonious development of industry that makes the difference. No city can become great commercially aside from the importance of her manufacturing interests. In the ten largest cities of the country, which are generally deemed especially centers of trade and speculation rather than of production, the value of products of manufacture amounts to one-third of all in the United States. The more industries which we build up in our midst the more rapid will be Omaha's advance in wealth, population and commercial importance."

Investigate Teller. One of the first duties of the senate when it convenes should be the investigation of Henry M. Teller. The air has been full of rumors and reports of his official malfeasance while secretary of the interior, ever since he stepped down and out to take his seat in the national senate. Every dirty pool of questionable odor which has been stirred up in land frauds, Indian swindling, badly filled contracts and wholesale claim jumping and occupation of government territory by cattle and railroad corporations, has been connected either directly or remotely, with charges against the ex-secretary of the interior. Senator Van Wyck's scathing denunciation of Mr. Teller as a plant tool of the railways, which created so much excitement in the last senatorial session, was followed by a score of editorial assurances from all parts of the west, that the half had not yet been told. Later came the scandal of the Indian leases in Oklahoma and the charges from San Carlos, and now the supervising architect of the treasury joins the ranks of the accusers with a story which, if verified, ought to secure Mr. Teller's prompt impeachment.

Architect Bell charges that when the new public building at Denver was to be built there was a general demand that Colorado stone should be used in its construction. The lowest bidders were the owners of the Rock Creek company, but when Mr. Bell examined the material, he pronounced it wholly unfit for building purposes. At this stage of the proceedings, according to Mr. Bell's statement, Secretary Teller put in an appearance and urged the architect to award the contract to the Rock Creek company on the ground that he had a brother who was interested in the quarries. Later when Mr. Bell rejected the bid and advertised for others, and when another quarry company was treated in the same way by the supervising architect, Mr. Teller overruled the decision of Mr. Bell by sending his own expert to make a favorable report on the quality of the stone and succeeded in getting it accepted. It has been difficult to secure proofs of Teller's operations, but there is a general impression that he has been and is a thoroughly corrupt man, who worked the interior department for all that it was worth. If an investigation which was warranted not to whitewash could only take him in hand, we imagine that several volumes could be filled with reports of his questionable transactions in the various bureaus under his charge. It will certainly pay to try it on.

No More Tips. The revolt of the commercial travelers against the giving of fees to hotel porters, waiters, hackmen and to employees in the Pullman service, has attracted much attention. Their example is now followed by the proprietors of the Palmer house in Chicago and Windsor hotel in New York, who have forbidden their employees to receive tips from guests. Other leading hotels in the country will, it is said, soon follow suit in assisting to put a stop to a pernicious system which has been grafted on America from England and the continent. The tip system is a scheme for gouging guests and increasing the profits of the proprietors. Employees are forced to resort to the degrading means in order to eke out the miserable wages paid them by their employers. In the Pullman service the salaries given the porters scarcely keep them in clothing, and the public is expected to make up the deficiency. Many of our hotel proprietors put up to the highest bidder all positions where tips can be extorted from travelers, and derive a good revenue from services which properly should be an item of expense. The custom has become so thoroughly adopted in America and the tips extorted so large that there

is a general revolt among the traveling public against its burdensome exactions. The idea of gratuities for labor not performed, or for trifling services, is un-American. It has only come into general adoption during the past two years, and there is no reason why it cannot be greatly checked, if not entirely eradicated. As soon as employers learn that the public will not assist them in meeting their pay-roll, and employees that they must look to employers and not to the public for their wages, a great deal will be accomplished.

The committee of the city council appointed to investigate the condition of "loose funds," which might possibly be applied to grading, has succeeded in scraping enough together to grade Harney and Burr streets. This needed improvement will be made this fall, more by good luck than by good management. Other grading, as much needed, will have to be postponed because of the usual scarcity of funds in the city treasury. That careless or corrupt assessments are responsible every year for placing drugs on the forward march of Omaha's progress, cannot be too often repeated. Year by year the same men who act as tools and catspaws for wealthy tax shirkers come again before the public asking for a re-election to the offices which they disgrace. Year by year the Bee has faithfully sought to arouse public sentiment against the assessment outrages and the discriminations which permit the broad acres of the rich to remain practically untaxed while the small lots of the poor bear the principal burden of uneven assessment. We assert again, as we have so often asserted, that the shameful inequalities in taxation in this city are injuring it in the eyes of capitalists abroad and preventing its rapid progress through the efforts of its citizens at home. Some of our property is taxed at less than ten per cent of its market value, a very large proportion at 15 and 20 per cent, and the least valuable only averages the third which the assessors pretend to make as a basis of valuation. So long as we continue to elect men who have found it profitable to discriminate in assessments and to serve wealthy patrons rather than the interests of the city, just so long will the cry of "no funds for improvements" be heard in our city council. The evil is one that no board of equalization can handle satisfactorily. Until a thorough reform is made in the methods of assessments the question can only be dealt with by a change in the assessors. New men and new assessment books will accomplish something. No change which could be made can be for the worse.

The demands for additional police protection are well grounded. Omaha has too small a police force in proportion to her population and territory. It has been too small for ten years past. But what is the use in crying for an increase when tax-dodging citizens and property dodging assessors are year by year defrauding the city treasury of funds which could be applied for this and other equally important purposes. "Short of funds" is the annual cry of Omaha within a month after the tax levy becomes available. Reform in the assessments must precede a good many other reforms in this city.

RIE, the rebellious Canadian, will be hung on the 10th of next month. The English privy council has declined to interfere, and sentence will accordingly be executed. Rie's execution will be the first for treason which Canadians have witnessed, and for this reason rioting among the half-breed population is feared.

Other Lands Than Ours. Denmark's revolutionary temper broke out during the past week in an attempt to assassinate Herr Estrup the Danish premier. Rioting and imposing demonstrations against the king have become so threatening that King Christian has ordered the garrison of Copenhagen to be reinforced. The trouble between the government and the people is of thirteen years standing, during which time the lower house, the folketing, has vainly persisted in its demand for the removal of the unpopular Estrup cabinet. Its attempt to coerce the government by refusing to vote supplies was boldly met; the king authorized the levy of taxes by royal decree and dissolved the folketing with a reprimand. This has since been done repeatedly, but each time a larger radical majority has been returned to the lower house. In the popular branch of the rigsdag, which met this month at Copenhagen, there are now scarce half a dozen supporters of the government. The upper house has remained loyal to the king. The trustees of Dakota university are said to have in shape a plan for establishing a college of science and industrial art, to be named after the late president of the Dakota has a school teacher who is worth her weight in gold. Her name is Belle Franklin. The Minnesota Presbyterians, during the meeting of their synod last week, dedicated Albert Lea college in institution for the education of young women, in which the essential features of the Mt. Holyoke seminary will be adopted. The college is intended as a supplement to the existing college, the Seminary of the West. In the public school at Lansdale, Pa., a lad having refused to join the other pupils in a recited recitation of the Lord's prayer, the school board decided that they would not attempt to control the conscience of the pupil, or make him recite the prayer, but at least read and assume the prayer, which was the subject of the case. The lady teacher threatened to resign if the open breach of discipline continued.

The general statistics of Massachusetts provide that any woman can vote for school committees who is 21 years of age, has resided within the state one year, and within the city or town in which she claims a right to vote six months next preceding any election, and who has paid by herself, her parents, guardian or trustees, a state, county, city or town tax, assessed upon her or her trustee in the state within two years next preceding such election.

England's Female Vote. Boston Transcript. The number of women householders in England is 217,000. Many of these are at the head of magnificent estates, and pay a large tax to the government. And yet they are shut out of the parliamentary franchise and cannot have a choice as to who shall represent their borough. They, however, have the municipal vote, which is most important to large landholders and taxpayers.

Views and Interviews.

The trouble in Trinity culminated just as I expected it would—in the resignation of Dean Millsaugh. I had a conversation with a member of the congregation. "The trouble began some time ago, but open expressions of dissatisfaction with Mr. Millsaugh as rector were said to have been suppressed during the life of Bishop Clarkson by reason of the family connection. Mr. Millsaugh was brought to Omaha by Bishop Clarkson from Fairbault, Minnesota. He is said to have been recommended to the churchmen on account of his thorough parish work, and certainly none of those who were most active in pushing him from his present position can deny that since his transfer to Trinity the same efforts that were so prominent in his church work in the north have characterized his labors here. Mr. Millsaugh has been very active in all that pertains to the pastorate, and also in the organization of charities and the visitation of the poor."

"What caused the pressure against him then?" asked the Bee's representative. "It was not with Mr. Millsaugh as pastor that fault was found by the faction in Trinity that finally succeeded in securing his resignation. While Trinity parish occupied a little wooden barn-like structure, the objections to Mr. Millsaugh's ministrations in the cathedral, as it was called, were few and far between. The inauguration of the new cathedral, and the assurances that the present handsome structure was to be the future home of Trinity people, no doubt gave rise among a certain faction that a more elegant pastor should be secured for the finished and elegant structure. You see Mr. Millsaugh is an every day man; a practical worker in the cause of the church. He is not a Garrett. There's the secret of the whole trouble, I believe. A part of our congregation want a high-priced pulpit orator, who will give them their money's worth in high-toned language and high-toned eloquence—a man who can wind up the English language like clock-work and then let the words come forth in the most polished combinations and as neatly as water off a duck's back. Mr. Millsaugh unfortunately is not that kind of a man. Open expressions of the feelings of these factionists were restrained on account of the regard for Bishop Clarkson, who was sincerely attached to Mr. Millsaugh, and who at one time had hopes of securing his elevation to a missionary bishopric in one of the territories. Mr. Millsaugh himself never gave any evidence that he knew of any such feeling existing against him in the church. He bore himself like a Christian gentleman. He fostered no jealousies, and listened to no complaints. His work in Trinity guild and in the parish missions connected with Trinity was continued with vigor. This was brought against him as an additional cause of complaint—that, knowing the feeling against him on the part of a faction in the church, he did not at once resign in order to prevent further disruption. The dissatisfaction, while probably not extending to a majority of the congregation, was, unfortunately for the peace of the parish, voiced by the most prominent of the vestry. Mr. Woolworth, who had done so much for the church, and whose donations to old Trinity are said to have amounted to over \$5,000, felt perhaps more strongly than any other the necessity, as he said, of securing a strong man to fill the pulpit of the cathedral and to add to the dignity of the magnificent ecclesiastical surroundings."

"I have heard it said that Bishop Clarkson, shortly before his death, exacted from Mr. Millsaugh that he would not resign the rectorship of the cathedral until formally requested to do so. The issue was distinctly made at the last Easter election of the vestry, when the opponents of Mr. Millsaugh asserted that distinct pledges had been made by Joseph Clarkson and Fred Davis—both relatives of the dean—that his resignation would be promptly forthcoming. Whether this is true, I cannot positively say, but the failure of Mr. Millsaugh to immediately resign, as followed by efforts to organize another parish in the southwest part of the city, which, it was intimated, would attract from old Trinity the most wealthy and aristocratic elements which have so long been in attendance there."

"The publication of Mr. Woolworth's letter in the Herald was the first public reference through the press to this unfortunate church difficulty. Mr. Millsaugh's resignation soon followed. His friends say he has recently, in a second letter, called to other churches, and that it is a shame and a disgrace that a man who has labored so long and faithfully for Trinity in its days of adversity should be so unceremoniously shifted to one side now that there is some honor attached to the rectorship of the parish which he has done so much towards building up; it is rather singular fact that since he has resigned, many of the ladies who had sided against him for the last two years have suddenly switched over to his side and expressed deep and genuine sympathy with the dean on account of his treatment by the parish. What the result will be it is difficult at this time to say, but I predict that there will be, in all probability, a permanent split in the congregation."

Nearer Heaven. "I notice the Christian church is being moved to the southeast corner of Capitol avenue and Twentieth street, and new Methodist church is to be built at the southeast corner of Davenport and Twentieth streets," observed a Capitol Hill man; "I don't understand why they want to get on the hill unless it is that they wish to be called high-church." "Not that at all," remarked a bystander; "it is simply because they want to get nearer heaven, and thus have the advantage over the other churches."

Another Railroad. "I wish I had time to give newspaper folks my ideas on the railroad situation," remarked W. R. Bowen. "Of course we want that road to the northwest, but that is bound to come any way, and therefore I think we are wasting time in that direction. What we want more than anything else is a railroad of uniform grade running east at least 120 miles. Such a road to transport coal and produce alone would pay."
