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A THREE-MONTHS' BANTLING. The Wonderful Growth of Douglas, Wyoming's Future Great.

Brick and Frame Buildings Going Up. Up on Every Side—The Railroad Prospect—A Bright Future.

Douglas, Wyo., Sept. 22.—[Correspondence of the Bee.]—Among the onward steps of civilization in the new northwest none is greater during the year of 1886 than the establishment of the town of Douglas.

Over two hundred frame structures—many commodious and ornamental in architectural detail—have been erected, or are approaching completion.

These substantial two-story brick business buildings are also going up. Over \$80,000 is invested in the real estate, which this building covers.

To the readers of the Bee who have learned already of our transfers in the populous Gate City of the west, the consideration of which approach this amount, the statement may not look big; but when they consider that twenty days ago the town was unincorporated and utilized for building was but an expanse of sage brush and cactus.

That within a month a railroad has reached this point, they will better understand what we mean by our extraordinary development in land and building.

Aggregating over \$300,000, is what an extraordinary ordinary future it predicts for the coming metropolitan of central Wyoming.

Yet, despite this palpable expression of confidence in the future of the place by the business men and other residents, who now number over 1,000, Douglas is not experiencing the "rush times" nor is it the land of "wild and woolly" towns which might be expected.

The spirit of speculation is not rife, nor does the prevailing sentiment appear to be that of many new towns where rose-colored enthusiasm carries close calculations or good judgment away on the wave of excitement.

The bidding on lots was somewhat spirited, and it is true the \$1,200 paid for a single corner 25x140 feet, which was sold by the city, is a record.
