

THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS.

Wheat Butters a Serious Beckset But Recovers Later.

CORN WITHOUT SPECIAL FEATURE

Oats Rule Dull, Closing Slightly Firmer—Provisions Attract More Attention—Cattle Lower—Hogs Rather Slow—Quotations.

CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKET.

Chicago, July 26.—[Special Telegram to THE BEE.]—The grain market had a backward day. Wheat, partially recovered, however, and closed strong. But corn did not rally to any extent, and closed speculatively weak, though shippers have no fault to find. They have large orders to fill, and in the depressed state of trade local are able to find grain to ship. Wheat cables were somewhat variable. Public cables quoted the advance mentioned yesterday in private messages, while private cables represented a rather easier feeling, and brightening weather prospects on the continent and in England. The export inquiry at the board and also at western and interior points where wheat is not held off the market, is very active. Locally, many of the leaders who were buying early turned sellers to-day. The market opened 1/4% higher and tempted realizations. The interior range was about the top. In any event, the best prices were obtainable around the beginning, when August was quoted at 80c, September at 80 1/2c, and December at 81c. The decline in carryover prices was not so sharp as it had been in the past, when a partial recovery followed.
