

USED TO A REDUCTION.

The Latest Kick Against the Freight Rate Schedule.

IT COMES FROM GRAND ISLAND.

The Board of Transportation Asked to Reconsider its Order—The Arguments Advanced—Lincoln News Notes.

LINCOLN BUREAU OF THE OMAHA BEE, 1023 P STREET, LINCOLN, AUGUST 23.

The money shares of Grand Island are opposed to the order of the state board of transportation reducing freight rates...

So far as we are acquainted with the feeling of our community we believe that all are satisfied with the November rates, and no discontent or dissatisfaction has been expressed by any of our honorable body.

The reduction you order, about 15 per cent below the November tariff, is too slight to affect the farmer or the merchant individually, either favorably or otherwise...

We believe the effect of crippling the earning power of railroads to this extent will completely discourage them from further construction and compel partial withdrawal of facilities we now enjoy...

The foregoing petition was signed by fifteen persons, representing the business interests of Grand Island, chiefly real estate men and bankers.

The following complaint was filed with the board of transportation to-day: R. C. Evans, complainant, vs. the Fremont, Elkhorn & Missouri Valley Railroad company, respondent.

Complainant for cause of complaint against the above named respondent, alleges: First—That he is a resident of Newport, Brown county, Nebraska, and that the above named respondent, the Fremont, Elkhorn & Missouri Valley Railroad company is a corporation organized under and by virtue of the laws of the state of Nebraska...

Second—That on the 31 day of September, 1887, the then board of railroad commissioners issued an order or recommendation requiring the said respondent to provide a depot building and other shipping facilities at said village of Newport, Neb.

That said respondent has provided a depot and side tracks at said village, but has wholly neglected to provide stock yards for the shipment of stock, although repeatedly requested to do so by your complainant and other citizens of said Newport, who have neglected and fails and refuses to provide the same.

Your complainant further alleges that said stock yards are necessary for the convenience and accommodation of the shipping public; that there is a large number of cattle raised and fed in the vicinity of Newport, and that there would be at least fifteen cars of cattle, horse and sheep, per month shipped from said village of Newport.

Wherefore your complainant asks that you will investigate the matters and things herein complained of and issue such order on the premises as may by you be found to be just and right.
