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AVICORY FOR HIPPOLYTE.

President Legitime's Army Routed and Thirteen Generals Killed.

New York, Feb. 6.—Special Telegram to the Bee.—The British steamer Harold which arrived yesterday afternoon from Port de Paix with coffee and mails from Henri Havt, brought some startling news of the latest Haytian effort to capture Hippolyte's stronghold, Gonaves, Johannes Hausiedt, Hippolyte's agent in New York, is authority for the statement that on the afternoon of January 30, the steamer Desaix, accompanied by the Toussaint Louverture, of Legitime's navy, came to anchor off Gonaves and demanded the immediate surrender of the town under penalty of bombardment.

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THE PARNELL COMMISSION

Continuation of the Testimony of the American Witness.

The Alleged Dynamite Plot.

Its Inspection and Development and the Movements of the Principal Investigators Described With Great Particularity.

The American Witness.

LONDON, Feb. 6.—At the session of the Parnell commission to-day William Beach, who is also known as Dr. De Caron, continued his evidence. He detailed a conversation which he had with Alexander Sullivan in June, 1887, at a meeting of the Parnell commission. Sullivan said that he had no radical change could be effected until they had a change of representatives on this side of the water, which would be very soon. Sullivan, referring to the visit to Ireland which he contemplated making, said he could not think of allowing Parnell to pay his expenses, as doing so would be tantamount to a confession of guilt on Parnell's part. Sullivan bitterly opposed discussion of this matter in open convention on the ground that it would look like a compromise. The Parnell party, the witness stated, that a conference of the "P. C." was held August 3, 1887. The meeting was held in the Parnell hotel, and the operations and recommended the formation of classes in mining engineering. At a secret meeting held prior to the convention of the Parnell party, the witness stated that he had made certain arrangements which had not been executed. These arrangements included the rescue of Davitt from prison and the fitting out of an expedition to South America which should result in the territory recently occupied by the English.

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
