CITY HALL STONE.

Contractor Coats, who has a large force of men working on the new city hall foundation, has returned from a trip to Keosauqua, Minn., which he undertook for the purpose of examining the stone found there, which has been suggested for use in the new structure. He had not seen the stone before and desired to become acquainted with it as he has with the other stones, which have also been suggested.

In color, the Keosauqua stone has rather a pinkish hue, but as to its texture and durability Mr. Coats declined to express an opinion. "The committee will meet, I think, next Saturday to determine what kind of stone will be used. I shall probably attend the meeting, and if my opinion is asked, shall give it as regards the stone which I should prefer to use."

"When I was building the court house, the commissioners wanted me to use certain kind of stone. I examined the material and became satisfied that it ought not to be used. I told the commissioners that I would not use it. The stone that I have put in the building cost me \$12,000 more than the stone I have rejected. The commissioners afterward saw the error of their objection by rejecting the stone for all purposes."

"They are thinking now of putting in stone instead of galvanized iron," continued Mr. Coats. "Who are?" "The council. They have asked me to figure the cost. The plans contemplate iron columns and window arches and tower. The cost of stone would not be very much greater."

"How much would it be? Fifty per cent?" "No, not twenty."

OR ELSE THE CARRIERS MUST BUY THEIR OWN TICKETS. The street railway officials say positively that no passes or free transportation will be allowed the letter carriers. The latter, they expect the street railway officials, as they are not public policemen like these officials.

Nowhere do the mail carriers ride free, and Omaha will not be made an exception to the rule.

PUGET SOUND. All points on Puget sound are more easily reached via the Northern Pacific than any other line. This is the only line reaching all parts of Washington territory, is the only line running coastwise sleepers through the territory direct to Tacoma, and is the only line via which through tickets can be purchased. The Northern Pacific allows stopovers at all points in Washington territory to holders of second-class tickets reading via their line.

THE RIVER GAUGE. Why it Indicates a Depth of Nearly Six Hundred Feet. The local signal office reports the river as being at a lower stage now than it has been in any September since 1853. At that time the gauge registered four feet and ten inches above zero, which indicates nearly twenty-three feet of water in the channel. At present the gauge shows about twenty-three and one-half feet of water.

The gauge used by the signal office is on the Union Pacific bridge where it has been in use for a number of years. The zero, or lowest point of the gauge, was fixed at the point reached by the water. This point was reached in 1817, when there were only eight feet of water in the channel between the piers of the bridge. About two months ago the zero point of this gauge was changed by order of the chief signal officer to correspond with the zero of the gauge in use at St. Louis. This action lowered the zero of the Omaha gauge 543.5 feet below the point of low water here in 1867, so that the reading of the gauge now is in the neighborhood of 566 feet, but indicates that the surface of the water here is 550 feet above the low water mark at St. Louis, but indicates only two feet and one-half feet above the low water mark of Omaha.

Morgan, for \$7,000, interest at 10 per cent on \$2,000 from August 1, and on \$5,000 from August 2. The petition relates that C. S. Morgan, the plaintiff, with Johnson and Frank C. Morgan as defendants, for \$7,000, on which the suit was filed, also for \$5,000, on May 2, no part of which has been paid.

A FAIR CIRCUIT. Shall Omaha Join St. Louis, Kansas City, Minneapolis, et al? As Secretary McShane and Mr. Gibbs, of the Omaha Fair association, have been at the Lincoln fair the greater part of the week, they have not had time to balance accounts and see whether the association is ahead in its finances. It is believed, however, that a handsome sum will be left after all bills and premiums are paid.

Mr. McShane suggests that it would be a good idea for Omaha if she wishes to have no perpetual success to enter into an alliance with St. Louis, Kansas City, Minneapolis and St. Paul and organize a circuit of fairs, similar to the circuit in which are the cities of Detroit, Cleveland, Buffalo, Utica and Springfield, Mass. Such an association would bring a greater number and finer class of attractions to Omaha than any of the eastern circuit named have some of the finest fairs in the country, and yet do not in any way interfere with each other. Omaha might well profit by this, by the example of the proper persons to take the matter in hand would be the board of trade.
